# Part 3 Training Outline

- Genealogical Information: Births, Marriages, Deaths, Burials, etc.
- Contact Information: Emails, Mobile Phone Numbers
- Historical Information: Photos, Stories, Letters, Documents, etc.



Q: What's the best way to spread information?

A: Tell someone it's a secret.

Q: What's the best way to keep information secret? A: Put it in a handbook.

- Section 5.3 <u>Duties of Family Representatives</u>: Each Family Representative will diligently perform the following duties during his or her term of service:
  - Coordinate activities between the Organization and the branch.
  - Communicate regularly with members of the branch regarding activities of the Organization.
  - Attend all meetings convened by the Officers.
  - Conduct business of the Organization, including receiving and approving regular reports and minutes of prior meetings.
  - Advise the Officers regarding their duties.
  - Compile and submit at least annually current contact information for each member of the branch.
  - Regularly submit to the Organization updated genealogical information on all members of the branch, including an annual report of all known births, marriages, deaths, and other pertinent genealogical and historical information occurring within the branch during the previous year.


# Genealogical Information

- Full Name (including maiden surname)
  - Example: Brent Jay Belnap
- Birth Date and Place (in "genealogy format")
  - Example: 4 Nov 1961; Ogden, Weber, Utah
- Marriage Date and Place
  - Example: 7 Sep 1991; Salt Lake City, Salt Lake, Utah
- Death Date and Place
- Burial Date and Place
- LDS Ordinance Data (when available)
- Spouse Information (including names of spouse's parents)

# "But Doesn't FamilySearch Already Have All of This Information?"

# NO! And Not By A Long Shot!

- FamilySearch is building the human family tree for the *primary purpose of linking families through Temple ordinances*
- FamilySearch does not confirm the accuracy of submitted information
- FamilySearch does not verify relationships
- FamilySearch contains many errors and has incomplete information
- FamilySearch does not arbitrate between correct and incorrect information
- FamilySearch does not allow posting of "deep" or extensive added content
- FamilySearch does not allow viewing records of living persons unless you created the record
- FamilySearch does not support locating living descendants
- FamilySearch does not coordinate research among living descendants
- FamilySearch limits communication capability among descendants



# Why Family Organizations Are Unique

Family organizations, including ancestral family organizations such as the Belnap Family Organization, play a unique role in:

- Uniting descendants
- Preserving and sharing family history information
- Undertaking special projects
- Pooling financial resources and talent
- Sponsoring and conducting research
- Ensuring the accuracy of and correcting information submitted to FamilySearch.org
- Encouraging descendants to learn about their ancestors
- Instilling a deeper appreciation of shared heritage
- Strengthening family ties among the living—and the dead

#### WELCOME

Latter Day Saint Ancestral Families Association (LDSAFA) is a free registration, publication and support consortium for LDS Ancestral Family Organizations (AFOs) that have historical connections to members of <u>The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints</u>. An Ancestral Family Organization (AFO) is larger than a parent or grandparent family and includes the descendants of a common ancestral couple. LDSAFA encourages the continuation of LDS AFOs through freely registering, publicizing and supporting their genealogical and historical activities. In fact LDSAFA can be considered a free "one-stop-shop" for locating links and information about LDS AFOs.

There are no costs for LDS AFOs to register and participate in LDSAFA, and all LDSAFA members are entitled to use the LDSAFA Member Seal and receive free listing, publicity and news reports on matters pertaining to LDS AFOs. LDSAFA identifies resources, practices and activities that various LDS AFOs have found meaningful and successful for family members through the years, including information and links on AFO communications, websites, documents and photos, genealogies, histories, videos, technologies, organizational structures.

#### Contact Information

- 🗡 Email Address (best practice: "an heir and a spare")
- 🗡 Mobile Telephone Number
- Mailing Addresses are no longer used by BFO as a means of communication due to cost, but can be useful in order to confirm relationships in online people search databases
- Landline Telephone Numbers, in addition to providing a contact point, can help confirm relationships in online searches



### "No One Is An Outsider"

"Descendants" of Gilbert, Adaline, and Henrietta include:

- In-law spouse(s)—"when you marry a person, you also marry the person's family"
- Adopted children
- Sealed children
- Biological children—even if adopted by other parent(s)
- Former spouses (to the extent they wish to be contacted)

Best practice: always also strive to include names of spouse's parents

### "Gold Standard"

All information is accurate and current and includes everything that would appear on a Family Group Record for that family: full names, dates, places of every descendant and spouse—including full names of spouse's parents—plus all LDS ordinance data where applicable





# "Whatever Is Worth Doing . . ."








