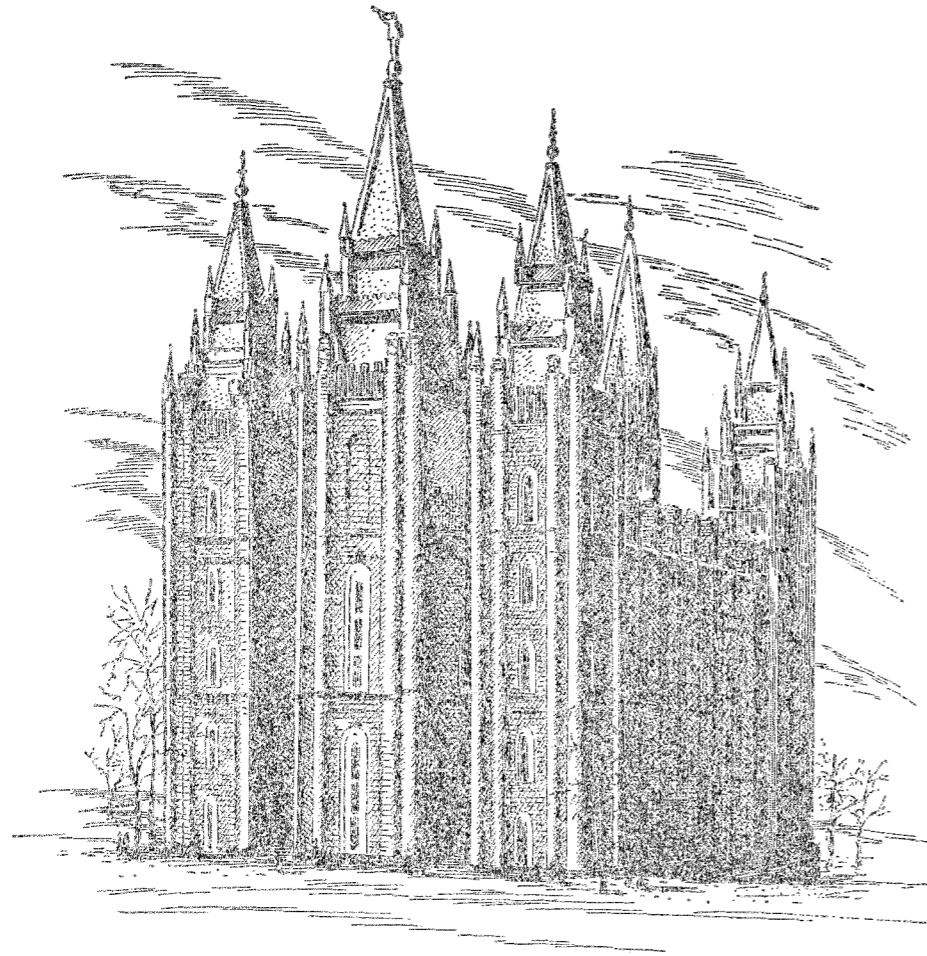

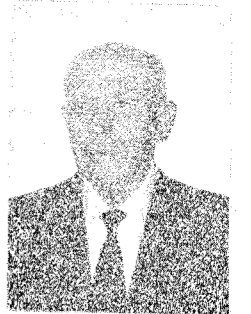

## EDITORIAL

The 1970 Belnap Family Reunion was held in Hooper, Utah. A large crowd participated, with more charts, maps, displays and pictures than we have seen at any previous reunion. The information given was of interest to all. Musical numbers, dancing, etc. were presented by members of the Family. Special tribute was paid to the 25 living grandchildren of Gilbert Belnap who were present. Special recognition was extended to the oldest -- Lettie Hammon Stoker, 87; John Belnap, 87; and Henry Belnap, 87.

A real concern to the Family Officers are pictures and stories that are being lost with death of Family members before they are written down or preserved. We encourage all members of the Family to PLEASE consider donating books, pictures, stories, relics, etc. to the Family Organization so we can preserve for our heritage the proud history and interesting highlights of the Belnap Family. No one is as interested in family pictures and stories as Belnaps. Please consider donating to the Family before other historical libraries. We are also planning to microfilm all records. Information and pictures will be returned to the lenders after filming.

## WORK

### KEEP THE BALL ROLLING

Since the Family Reunion in June 1970, the Genealogical research and temple work has been increasing.

Completed are 42 families on the old-type Family Group Sheets, with a few more to be returned from the Index Bureau.

On the new-type temple sheets, 101 individuals have been cleared for baptism, endowments and sealing. 79 couples have been cleared for sealing. 63 individuals and 244 couples have been sent to the Genealogical Society for clearance.

We have just received from Essex and Hertfordshire, England 179 couples and 300 individuals that are in the process of placing them on temple sheets for the Index Bureau.

That's a total of 42 families and 1,045 individuals that we as a family have given a chance to accept the gospel and the temple ordinances this past year. As yet we have not been able to place these people on our direct line. In time we hope to collect enough information to do so. At least some of them are related. But all are God's children; hence all are relatives. LET'S KEEP THAT BALL ROLLING.

# HISTORIAN'S REPORT

Salt Lake City, Utah  
June 10, 1971

Dear Kin Folk:

At the Belnap Family Reunion held in Franklin, Idaho, July 1, 1939, I was sustained Historian. To this office I have humbly offered my devotion, through thirty two years. My husband, Grand Councilor of the World Kerr Klan, and I regularly attended officers' meetings and reunions. Since his death, I have missed one reunion, but I sent in my report.

After the formal acceptance of my desire to be replaced and because of trouble with my eyes, I have hired a regular secretary to assist in searching out, organizing and taking care of materials which I felt were of value to the Belnap Organization. These materials will be ready to give to the Belnap Family Organization at the next reunion.

The following has been accomplished during my term of office as Historian, between July 1, 1939 and July 20, 1968 Reunion: Continuous calls for historical facts and interesting items have been made to the entire family. Much has been received but not from as many as I would have liked. Several people have taken pains to regularly send in historical facts from Belnap families in their districts although I had expressed hope for more so that all families could be represented each year. To those who have made an effort to respond I offer my sincere thanks.

Reports of births, deaths, anniversaries, missionary calls, marriages in and out of the L.D.S. Temples and interesting experiences such as promotions, outstanding services to church and community and various interesting experiences have been made at each family reunion. Photographs donated and otherwise collected have been given to the organization. The small photograph album given me by Mary Belnap Lowe has been repaired and the names of the persons included and their home stakes have been typed and put in the album. Five periods of historical items bound in three scrap book covers have been completed and submitted to the organization. All names of persons included in these volumes have been indexed.

The Original By Laws of the Family, prepared by Judge Hyrum A. Belnap have been preserved. Many announcements of reunions are included. The division and distribution of Gilbert Belnap's personal

effects by his wife, Adaline, and Hyrum Belnap's report of the monies left by Adaline at her death are included. The story of the life of Vinson Knight, prominent early church authority and member of the Belnap Clan, has been added. This story was written by Lola Belnap Coolbear, largely dictated by Vinson's daughter, Adaline Knight Belnap.

After many requests for the original letter of Reuben McBride's account of his baptism for the dead in the Nauvoo Temple, the first in the Church in this dispensation, I gave it to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. This was to Martha McBride Knight in response to her request. Flora Belnap made photostats of this letter in 1939 and gave the McBride family a copy of the same about that time. The B.Y.U. historian, Dr. Albretson, has called twice in an effort to claim the original letter. So a photostat of it was given to the B.Y.U. and also one to Dr. Cooley at the University of Utah.

The original diary of Gilbert Belnap was placed by Flora Belnap in the L.D.S. Church Historian's Department. A photostat of the original handwritten diary has now been made and a copy given to the University of Utah and Brigham Young University Historical departments. Now students using items from this for a doctorate may have an accredited copy which will be accepted by any university or historical society as valid reference. At this time two scholars are gratified for access to this accredited copy.

When Hyrum Belnap's estate was being considered by the court, I asked permission to copy the Belnap genealogical records. These records consisted of three long books of Belnap genealogy which was commenced by my father many years ago. When Flora Belnap was very young, she continued recording the Belnap genealogy under the direction of her father. This she continued to do making it a life's work. When the copies of the three books were made, the books were returned to the courts. After the copies were verified, the first copy was given to Mead Belnap (the Belnap Family Organization genealogist). This was done before the estate was settled.

After the death of Martha McBride Knight, there were found in her precious chest many letters relating to McBride genealogy. These had been sent her by her brother, Reuben McBride. During the summer of 1970, I had these letters photostated and several copies of them made available to the McBride family through their historian, Della Dame Edmunds.

Also among Martha McBride Knight's effects in her precious chest were found property deeds which she said her husband, Vinson Knight, had told

her to take good care of until they were called for. When my father saw these deeds, he said they were Church Property Deeds and belonged to the L.D.S. Church. A letter accompanied by a photo to prove the date of their delivery to the Church has been sent to Dr. Kimball, President, and to Dr. T. Edgar Lyon, Historian of the Nauvoo Restoration Organization.

A representative from the Historian's Office has taken 2 discs containing the voice of Hyrum Belnap as he narrated the details of the molasses mill accident which occurred to Captain James Brown. The lingering effects of the accident later caused Captain Brown's death. These discs were made many years ago at the University of Utah Phonetics Laboratory by Professor Walter A. Kerr. It is hoped now that a tape recording can be made from these discs so that Hyrum Belnap's voice telling of the incident may be made available.

An L.D.S. Historian Department representative has photostated many of the certificates and other papers proving the offices held by Gilbert Belnap. Many interesting receipts and reports along with signatures of early Church officers also were copied.

All papers and copies obtained by the Church Historian may be viewed by those persons interested. They may be put under glass and shown by an attendant. It is a great privilege to have our precious materials in the safest place we know of and handled by reliable people.

Accompanying this report, as a gift, is a Book of Remembrance containing all papers either original or copied which have been in my possession. That is the remainder of the material that has not been included in previous volumes.

It has been a great pleasure to serve in taking care of articles and organizing historical material, both the great amount which I have collected and also that which Adaline Knight Belnap gave to her son Hyrum as his share of the estate of her husband, Gilbert Belnap.

Your Historian of these many years rejoices that all the materials which have come into her possession are now available for the use and appreciation of all those that will make an effort to do so.

## ENGLISH RESEARCH

The following information was sent in by Frank Smith, who is doing research for the Belnap Family in England:

"When we speak of 'spelling variations' it should be remembered that there was no accepted way of spelling any word until about the last 150 years. Thus, a person wrote as they heard and this again was largely affected by dialect, of which there are many different ones in England.

Places came under the same circumstances so that a place like Sawbridgeworth is spelled in a multitude of different ways.

The biggest departure on the Belnap spelling is from Beltoft to Belknap but it is noticed that several times the name is given 'Beltoft alias Belknap'. This is fortunate because one could hardly say that Beltoft was phonetic with Belknap. Perhaps the family were not even sure what their name was or wished to be distinguished from another family having the same name but not known to be related.

Here are some spellings that have been found:

Many more could be added if we consider that it was common to add an 'e' at the end of a word without it meaning anything. Then there could be a double 'p' and a double 't'. The 'e' in the middle could be 'ea' without changing the pronunciation so one could easily concieve many more spellings.

The surname is not too common but is reasonably scattered throughout the whole of England."

# PEOPLE, PLACES & EVENTS

## BELKNAP CRATER:

Located in Deschutes and Linn Counties, Oregon. Elevation 6,877 feet over McKenzie Pass. Names after James Henry Belknap, who was born 25 March 1848. He was the son of Rollin S. Belknap who developed Belknap Springs in Oregon. They were early residents along the McKenzie River.

Belknap Crater is a typical shield volcano--a broad dome, similar in shape to an ancient Grecian shield, built up of overlapping flows. It is the source of the Belknap lava flows. Little Belknap, that nubbin of a black dome that lies to the east of Belknap, is a parasitic cone on the flank of Belknap.

In its first stage of eruption, Belknap Crater spread volcanic ash over the older glaciated lavas of the high Cascades. Belknap Crater is less than 3,000 years old. The age of Belknap lavas was determined by their relation to older lavas near Clear Lake.

McKenzie Pass Highway is an old trail used by the Warm Springs Indians for summer travels to the McKenzie valley and was the first route across the Cascades in this area. It became a toll road in 1872, a free county road in 1898 and a State Highway in 1917. The road today is paved, but slow speed; it winds in hairpin turns from U.S. 126 near McKenzie Bridge east to U.S. 20 at Sisters. Come only during the summer months for the road is snowbound most of the year. The pass is usually open between July and October.

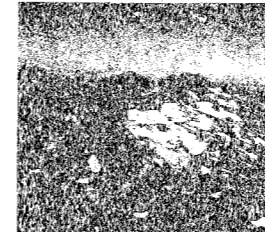

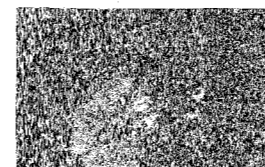
Lane County, Oregon. R. S. Belknap located these springs in November 1869 and conceived a plan for developing them. They now

## *Ten Million Years Ago*

**Build up of the High Cascades** - From McKenzie Pass a vast expanse of black lava stretches to the skyline and the horizon is dotted with cinder cones, islands and towering snow capped peaks rising to elevations over 10,000 feet. This spectacular landscape began to form over ten million years ago with the development of the high Cascades. Mt. Hood, the Three Sisters, Mt. Washington, Mt. Jefferson and Three Fingerted Jack grew as fiery volcanoes during the last several million years. Their eruptions spread andesitic lavas over much of the area. Some of these older, light-colored andesitic volcanic rocks may be seen on the islands.

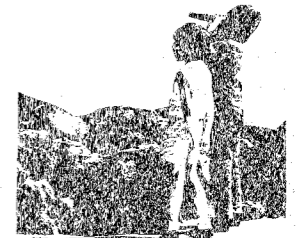
**Age of Glaciers** - During the last stages of mountain building, glaciers began to form. Ice filled the plateau between the Sisters and Mt. Washington, gouged out great depressions in the landscape and carved tons of material from the newly formed mountains. At their greatest extent, Ice Age glaciers filled the McKenzie Pass area as far west as Blue River. Evidence that the glaciers once covered the McKenzie Pass area is found in striations on the old andesite rocks at Crater Lake and on the islands. These scratches, which show the direction the glacier moved, were caused by rock caught up in the ice rubbing against bedrock. About ten thousand years ago, the glaciers began to retreat. Today's snowfields and glaciers high on the mountains are the last remnants of the Ice Age. The glaciers continue their work of eating rock from the mountains. Much of this material is deposited in moraines at the foot and sides of the glaciers. Pulverized rock, known as rock flour, is picked up on windy days and resembles smoke clouds over the mountains.

**Eruption of Belknap Crater** - In its first stage of eruption, Belknap Crater spread volcanic ash over the older glaciated lavas of the high Cascades. Belknap is a shield shaped cone formed by liquid lava welling from a central conduit. Little Belknap was formed later as a parasitic cone on the flank of the main cone. Pahoehoe and aa lavas from these eruptions extend east

to windy Point and west to the edge of the upper McKenzie valley below Clear Lake. Belknap Crater is less than 3,000 years old. The age of Belknap lavas was determined by their relation to older lavas near Clear Lake. Clear Lake was formed by lava flows from Sand Mountain and associated vents, which dammed the McKenzie River. Trees drowned by the rising waters still stand beneath the lake's surface and were dated by radiocarbon tests in 1963. Clear Lake and the Sand Mountain lava flows are about three thousand years old. Most recent of all the lava flows in the McKenzie Pass area are those from Yapoah, Collier and Pansin-Oni Craters on the flank of the North Sister. Lava from Yapoah Crater flowed north and overlies the Belknap flow at McKenzie Pass. The Observatory is built on the west edge of the Yapoah flow. Generally, the lavas from Yapoah Crater are block lava, or aa.

## *Today*

**A Changing Landscape** - Today the landscape continues to change, though in less violent ways. The alternate forces of weather wear away the mountains, and a few glaciers continue their work. The volcanoes are quiet now, but geologists believe the fires on Oregon's Cascade crest are only sleeping, and may someday erupt again.



bear his name. Salt Springs Post Office was established October 26, 1874 with Belknap as postmaster. About 1891 the name was changed to Belknap Springs.

### BELKNAP RIFLES:

The following article appeared in the Shooting Times Magazine of May 1966, pages 17-18:

The place I was heading for was one of those gracious early Vermont homes that had been a way station on the old Boston Post Road in a little hamlet a few miles north of St. Johnsbury. When we arrived, I asked the owner if by any chance he might have an old rifle made by John Belknap. His answer was, "Yes, I do. It is not for sale, but would you like to see it?" and he invited us in.

The Belknap rifle was in its original case on a mantle in the parlor. I doubt that I have sufficient command of words to adequately describe it, but it was the most exquisitely done American arm that I have ever seen. The lock, tang, and hammer are plated with German silver and all are beautifully engraved in scroll. The lock is signed "John Belknap - St. Johnsbury, Vt."

What little I have been able to learn of the life of John Belknap is very interesting. He and his brother, Ames, Jr., were sons of Ames Belknap, Sr., who died in 1883 at the mature age of 78. The elder Belknap was a blacksmith by occupation and an artist in his field. He was one of the oldest soldiers in the Union Army, being nearly 60 years of age. He accompanied General William Tecumseh Sherman on his famous March To The Sea and distinguished himself by his uncanny ability in the repair of locomotives and rolling stock, so necessary to the invading army's success. He was described as nothing short of a genius in setting up and operating a blacksmith forge under the most difficult conditions.

So far as I have been able to ascertain, neither of the Belknap sons served in the Civil War. This information, however, has not been completely verified. It is known that the two brothers took over their father's blacksmith business in St. Johnsbury and produced a large number of high quality hand tools and knives, many of which are said to still be in use in Vermont.

John Belknap, at a date not clear, took up gun making and hydraulic engineering, more or less as sidelines. As a hydraulic engineer, he built some top grade water wheels and pumps. He also built the first dam across the Passumpsic River in the town of St. Johnsbury. It was this dam that led to his death by a tragic accident in 1888.

The dam building project was beset with troubles and difficulties from its inception. It became the subject of ridicule, criticism and jokes, some of them rather crude. Finally Belknap declared publicly that he would "have water over the dam by the following Saturday in spite of God (a pretty strong statement for a Vermonter) man, or the devil."

On that fateful Saturday morning, just as the water was beginning to flow over the dam, a gigantic timber was seen moving down stream with the current. Yankee frugality dictated that the valuable wood be salvaged. Belknap set out in a small skiff to attach a line to it. The little craft swamped and was swept over the dam with its occupant and the coveted timber. John Belknap was drowned.

Lettie Stoker, Roy First Ward, Lake View Stake, Roy, Utah, has spent more than fifty years working on genealogy. She has traced ten lines, one as far back as seven generations.

In addition to her genealogy work, she pays regular visits to the temple, bakes her own bread, which she shares with others, sews, and embroiders lovely sets of pillowcases.

Her family of eleven children, fifty-four grandchildren, 171 great-grandchildren, and nine great-great-grandchildren have benefitted very much from her work. Her life has been an inspiration to all who know her.



Harlem, Montana:

A weekly newspaper is causing something of a stir on the Fort Belknap Indian Reservation in Harlem, Montana. Other reservations have newspapers, but the "Camp Crier" at Ft. Belknap is the only paper that carries "Blue's Recipes of the Week." Blue is actually Edna Miller, a member of the Assiniboine tribe. She lives on the reservation. The newspaper is put together and printed in the Extension Service's trailer office on the reservation.

A typical issue of the Camp Crier will include announcements of meetings and other events, accident reports, wedding and birth announcements, interviews with local residents, news about people who have recently come to work on the reservation, USDA plentiful food reports, farm crop information, and advertisements. Social news is carried in a column called the "Moccasin Grapevine."

At the latest count, the Camp Crier had 800 subscriptions. Most of the newspapers go to Indians on the reservation, but an increasing number of papers are now mailed to Indians who live in places as far away as Australia, England, and Alaska, and to servicemen in Vietnam.

# Happy Jazz Birthday

On April 1, 1920, the captain of the old Maisonville liner, put ashore in the port of Honolulu one William Jones Belknap. He was a young man who had led a group of high spirited young people in a round of revelry that had begun in San Francisco and ended, as far as the captain was concerned only after the boat docked. For the Territory and State of Hawaii the revelries have continued over the past 50 years.

It was in the first hours of board ship the brash young Belknap boy with the red hair and wide grin had approached a group of young women with the following introduction, "I'm Kid Jazzbo from the Springs with my bottle and horse, and saw about joining us fellows." The girls agreed, an unimportant point really except that they hung the

name of "Jazz" on William Jones Belknap and there it has remained until today. Jazz was met when he came ashore by his new employer, one "Ma" Langdon Boyle.

Jazz had been hired to sell advertising for "Ma" and it was quite an experience. He sold his first ad on his first

day to Durant Irvine. His total commissions that day were \$20.00 and remember this was in 1920. The second day his commissions were \$23.00 and the third \$42.00. Jazz was convinced he had landed in an Irishman's heaven, the proverbial land of milk and honey. He went two whole weeks without another sale, the victim of the aloha spirit, but says, "always buy from a new salesman the first time he comes around to welcome him to the Islands" and the Scotch and Chinese ancestry of many of the merchants that says, "there's no use buying anything other than if you can get out of it." "Jazz" survived the dry period and with his highly individual personality became a successful salesman and a well-known man about Honolulu and points nearby and nearby.

His career in Honolulu was interrupted by an opportunity to take a show, a little affair called "The Lady and the Tiger to Hilo for R.K. Fernandez. B. K. was a friend of

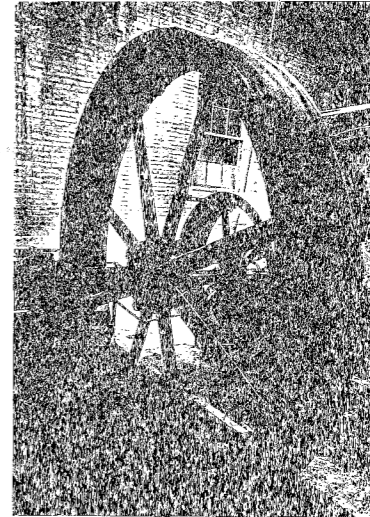

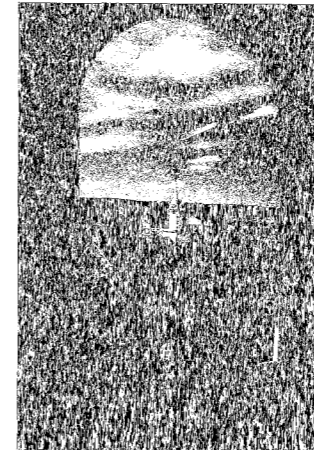

YANKEE MILLS

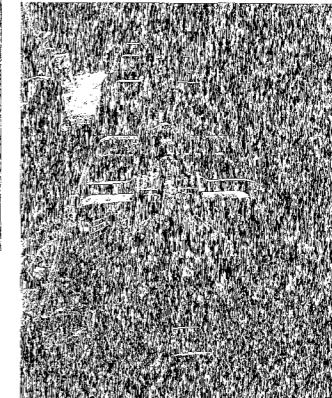
New Englanders are generally quick to save old houses and churches, but they are less eager to preserve the old mills that once made the Northeast the textile center of the U.S. These handsome red-brick mills were once a familiar sight along the banks of rivers and canals, but over the years most of the companies went out of business and already many mills have fallen before the wrecker's ball. A few of the mills still standing have been modernized and are still operative, but most have long since been closed down, and their antique machinery is idle. In Laconia, N.H., two such mills (left and below) are threatened with demolition. An irate citizens' committee has launched a vigorous campaign to save them, but city officials would just as soon clear the valuable riverfront property. By the year's end, Laconia may well have lost its mills—and gained a brand-new asphalt parking lot.

#### WIDOW OF PROPHET JOSEPH SMITH DEAD

Mrs. Martha K. Smith, widow of the Prophet Joseph Smith, and her great great grandson.

A woman who was married in turn to Vinson Knight, presiding Bishop of the Mormon church; to Joseph Smith, its first president, and to Heber C. Kimball, died yesterday of old age at the home of Bishop Belnap in Hooper. She was Mrs. Martha Kimball. She was in her 97th year. She was born March 17, 1805, at Chester, Washington County, N.Y. She was married to Vinson Knight July 26, 1826. Her husband died July 31, 1842 at Nauvoo. He was the presiding bishop of the Mormon church at that time.

She came to Utah in 1850, settling in Ogden, where she made her home for a number of years. She went to Hooper in 1869, where she had lived most of the time since, although visiting often with relatives in other parts of Utah.

She was sealed by the Mormon rite to the Prophet Joseph Smith at Nauvoo a short time before his death.

After the death of the Prophet Joseph Smith, she was married to Heber C. Kimball, and by him she had one child, who died in infancy. (It was a son.) She was the mother of six other children by her first husband, Mr. Knight, and three of these survive her, all of them being between 70 and 80 years of age. They are Mrs. Almira Hanson, who resides near Cleveland, Ohio; Mrs. Adaline Belnap, living at Hooper, this county, and James Knight, who resides at Clearfield, Piute county. She had a great many grandchildren and great grandchildren and several great-great grandchildren. Pictures of the old lady grouped with four of her direct descendants are to be found in the homes of most of her Ogden relatives.

The picture of the child in the accompanying illustration is that of Heber Ballantine, grandson of former Sheriff Gilbert R. Balnap, and great grandson of the daughter at whose home the old lady passed away.

The physical strength and endurance of Mrs. Knight was well-nigh marvelous. For nearly twenty years she had not used spectacles. Her needlework was a model for fineness amongst all her acquaintances for the past fifty years. She was a great reader, particularly of the daily papers, reading every word of telegraphic news, and during the Spanish-American War she was regarded as one of the best posted persons in Weber County on the military operations of

the contending forces.

Two or three years ago at a birthday reunion of the family held in her honor, Mrs. Knight was called on for a speech, and prefaced one of considerable length with a recital of the tremendous changes which had taken place in her lifetime, mentioning the steam engine, the modern printing press and the telegraph. To illustrate the latter she described with what slowness news traveled when she was a young woman of 40, and wound up her recital of how on that very day the entire country was able to watch every detail of a little affair at Carson City when Corbett was knocked out by Fitzsimmons.
