Revocation of letters patent dated 14 March last granting to the king's knight John Blount during pleasure the offices of steward and master forester of the forest of Roteland with the accustomed wages, fees and profits; as, on the complaint of William de Burgh and Marjory his wife that they were in possession of the same by the name of the bailiwick of the keeping of the forest by virtue of a fine levied in the court of Richard II before Robert Bealknap and his fellows, justices, between them and Edward Dalyngrugg, 'chivaler,' and Elizabeth his wife, deforciant, until they were unjustly removed by colour of the said letters, the king ordered the sheriff of Rutland to summon the said John to appear before him in Chancery at a certain day now past to show cause why the letters should not be revoked, and the sheriff returned that he summoned him by John Multon, William Swafeld, William Ingold and Richard de Oxendon, and he appeared by Robert Watton his attorney and judgement was given against him.

Grant to the king's servitor James Turnour of a tenement and two virgates of land in Neubold, co.
