evi Derlin Hammon, was the fifth child of Levi Byram Hammon and

Martha Jane Belnap. He was born on October 14th, 1877, in So. Hooper, Davis County, Utah. He was blessed on November 20th 1877, by his grandfather Gilbert Belnap. 2

At the age of eight, Derlin was baptized and confirmed a member of the LDS Church. This event took place on June 3rd, 1886, and was performed by Edwin Parker.³ Derlin was confirmed a member that same day by Alexander Patterson, in the South Hooper Ward.⁴

Derlin attended school in South Hooper and then attended the Weber Stake Academy, in Ogden.⁵

Derlin was seventeen, and living in South Hooper, when he met Emma Hawkeswood. Emma had come to Hooper care for her grandfather, Joseph Weller.⁷ They both attended the same school during the winter months and during that time they started going to parties and dances together. After Emma returned home, to Lewiston, in March, they continued to write. Derlin had made only two trips to Lewiston, Utah to see Emma during this time. Emma's sister, relates one of those trips in her own biography; "I remember when Emma and Derlin were courting. He lived in Roy and it took him two days to come see Em and then he'd stay all night. I couldn't imagine what courting couples did when they wanted to be alone. It was a mystery to me so I peeked at them through a crack between the logs. Great to my disappointment, when I found they weren't doing anything except laughing and talking, just the same as they did when we were all together."


In preparation for his forthcoming marriage, Derlin was re-baptized 6 May 1898 and on May 8th ordained a Teacher, by Elder Middleton. Later Derlin was ordained a Priest. Derlin and Emma were married on May 11th, 1898 in the Salt Lake Temple by John R. Winder and shortly following their nuptials moved on to the Charlie Rundquist's Farm, where Derlin cared for the entire place.

Derlin and Emma later moved into Ogden to work for Charlie Nelson, in his livery stable, taking care of his horses. They lived on the corner of Grant and 23rd St. in a part of a house owned by Mrs. Levitt, while she lived in the other part. Derlin worked nights, so Emma was alone much of the time (seemed to be commonplace among the Hammon women). In the Spring of 1899, they returned back to Roy and lived with Derlin's parents on the family farm.

After their first child was born, they moved to a little house across the street. This house was owned by Joseph Belnap, Derlin's uncle. While living

there, Derlin had a two room house built for them just north of his parent's home, on the farm.

Their second child, George Leonard Hammon was born on February 7th, 1901 and on January 29, 1903, their third child and first daughter was born. When she was 8 days old Derlin blessed her and gave her the name of Ruth LaVon Hammon.

After Derlin and his family moved into their new home, Derlin went to work for his father's construction business, in Blackfoot, Idaho. Derlin was home only every three or four months and then for only a few days at a time. He was the foreman on a canal construction job in Fallon, Nevada. A project to bring water into Fallon. The next year Derlin went to Oakley, Idaho on construction of more canals. It was on this job that Uncle Derlin drank some contaminated water and got Typhoid Fever. He became very ill and had to return home. He was sick for about two weeks before passing away on June 28th 1904.¹⁰

Derlin was a very kind and loving husband and father. His funeral was held in the Park at the Weber Co., Infirmary on July 1st, 1904. Derlin's burial took place in the cemetery in Roy.

"We are very sorry to be called upon to mourn the loss of a very promising young man of the ward, Derlin Hammon. The funeral was well attended. The largest crowd ever held in Roy up to that time. Present were: Weber Stake Lewis W. Shirtliff and his first Presidentcounselor Charles Middleton, Bishop Lewis J. Taylor of the Harrisburg Ward, Bishop William W. Child of the Hooper Ward, Bishop George Kendal of So. Weber Ward, Patriarch George W. Larkin of Ogden, and Bishop Sanford Bingham of Riverdale along with many other prominent Brothers and sisters from all over the country. The Hooper choir furnished the music, also a beautiful solo by Weltha Belnap, one of Derlin's cousins from Ogden."11

Emma " Aunt Em" Hawkeswood

I was born July 2, 1878 in Hasbury, Worcestershire, England, the daughter of Miciah Hawkeswood and Hannah Grove. The first thing that I can remember in my life is when father and mother left England and came to America for the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Mother's folks were quite bitter and didn't want them to come to America. They never even bid them good-bye.

Hawkeswood came to Utah the year before the folks. Her and Grandpa Hawkeswood had the joined Mormon Church a year before Miciah's birth, Grandpa and died and Grandma Hawkeswood came to America alone.

We set sail from Liverpool, England the 11th of April 1882, on the




Birth certificate of Emma Hawkeswood

steamship *Nevada*, arriving in Richmond, Cache Co., Utah on May 2, 1882,¹² after almost a month's journey by ship and train. I can remember that first night, Sister Wiser had made a bed on the floor out of straw tick for my two brothers and sister and myself. John, my brother, was put on one side, my sister Levina on the other side, and myself and Ernest in the middle. We were all so small she put us crosswise so we could all have plenty of room. I wasn't able to walk until I was four years old, it must of been so kind of paralysis.

I can remember my baby brother, William George, taking sick with the measles and dying soon after we arrived here. He had lots of brown hair and mother had it combed so pretty he looked like a big doll in his casket.

When I was five years old, I was playing with another little girl, and her big brother picked me up in one arm and his sister by the other. I screamed and he dropped me, pulling my

arm out of place at the shoulder. We had no doctors close in those days, so my mother raised my arm up high and it went back into place.

We lived in Lewiston, Utah for three or four years and then moved to Fairview, Idaho on Ellen Egberts' farm. We stayed on the farm about five years. We were so close to the little mountain and two and a half miles from school, and the snow used to get very deep. My brother John, being the oldest, used to go ahead of us and break the trail. Sometimes we rode to school on horseback.

I had a real pal named Emma Perry, we used to walk to school together and also church. We would share our little secrets with one another, and we children all seemed to have a good time. I attended school in Fairview, Franklin, Lewiston and Hooper.

One day, my father and mother had gone to the store to get groceries, leaving my brother Ernest and I to watch a flock of sheep on the farm. We saw a large cat come out of the chicken coop carrying off a chicken. Ernest grabbed a pitchfork and we chased that cat over a ledge of rocks and ran into a hole. We climbed upon the rock and every time that cat would jump at us, we would stick him with the pitchfork, taking both of us to hold him down. It was so mad and strong, but we managed to kill him. When father returned home we showed him the cat, he just about passed out when he saw that we had killed a very large wild cat. Ernest was eight at that time and I was ten, both of us were barefooted. Times were hard in those days, but we never went hungry.

Levina and I had three suits of underwear between us, so mother put

clean ones on both of us and washed the other.

At Christmas time we got only a piece of candy in our stockings, but that was enough to make us happy. Mother always made a plum pudding and fruit cakes, so we had a good dinner.

We moved back to Lewiston before mother died. When she died they called it inflammation of the bowl, but it was probably appendicitis. She died on July 26, 1893. We buried her in the Lewiston Cemetery.

Father was a good father, but so religious he never had a doctor. He relied no faith and prayer. I think that if mother would of had a doctor, she could of lived longer.

When I was fifteen years old, I became sick with Typhoid Fever, as did my brother Ernest and my sister Levina.

On September 25th, 1894, my Grandmother Weller, my father's mother, passed away in Hooper, Utah. Father sent me to Hooper to take care of Grandpa Weller, which I did until I returned home in March 1895. Since mother had died, father needed me to care for my younger brothers and sisters, while he went out to work. I worked hard, doing all the sewing and housework. It was very hard at times, but I am thankful that I was able to do it.

While I lived in Hooper, I became acquainted with Derlin Hammon. We wrote letters to each other for four years after I left. He came to see me twice during that time and I had gone to see him once. On April 11, 1898, I went to Hooper to stay with a friend for a month, and on May 11, 1898, Derlin and I went to the Salt Lake Temple to be married. We had a wedding dance later in the Hooper Hall.

Later that month, Derlin rented a farm from Charlie Rundquist, and Derlin and I moved there. That fall, we moved to Ogden where Derlin started working for Charlie Nelson in a livery stable. We stayed in Ogden until the following Spring, when we moved back to Roy, moving in with Derlin's parents.

On April 22, 1899, our first child was born. We named him Wallace Derlin Hammon.

Derlin started working for his father, herding sheep and as a construction worker, which kept him away from home much of the time. Derlin built a home on his father's farm not far from their home.

At this time, we were members of the Roy first ward, which was a part

of the Kaysville Branch. The first ward was soon organized with Thomas Holland as Bishop.The membership was so few that if the whole ward turned out, it would no more than fill two small rooms of our house. Wallace, our first child, was the first child to be blessed in this new ward.

On February 7th, 1901, another son was born to us. named him George Leonard Hammon. We were happy with our two children and Derlin was so very kind, as were his father and mother. On January 29, 1903, we were blessed with our third child, a girl, which we named

Ruth LaVon Hammon and on the following June 28th, 1904, tragedy struck at our home, Derlin, my husband, passed away with typhoid fever, leaving me with


three young children and another child on the way. Both Wallace and Leonard were also sick with typhoid, but both recovered. Derlin's parents promised Derlin, that they would help care of his family, which they did the remainder of their lives, sharing with me and my children, the same as they did with their own large family; God Bless their memories.

The people of the Roy Ward were also very kind to us for which I am very grateful to them. My father, my brothers and sisters, also helped us all they could. We always had plenty to eat and a comfortable home, kind friends and

relatives to help me. I am grateful to my heavenly father for his many blessings.

The following October 30th, I gave birth to a son. His grandfather, Lee Hammon, blessed him, and gave him the name, Levi Byram Hammon II, his own full name.

On June 11, 1905, I became a member of the Relief Society, Charlotte Ann Holland was President from 1910 to 1913 and I taught a group of children in the Religion Class. In 1908, I was put is as Assistant Secretary in the Relief Society, sister Holland had died in 1912 and Margaret Child had replaced her as President. I remained Assistant Secretary until 1914 when and Jennett Purdy were asked to teach the Theology Class in Relief Society, which

I did until 1917. I was released as Assistant Secretary and Teacher in 1917, and I was appointed as Secretary.

In 1915, Levi Byram, Derlin's father, passed away. It was a very sad time for all and his funeral was well attended. War had already broken out and in April 1917 my oldest son, Wallace, enlisted in the Navy. This was during World War I. Leonard, my second boy was working at the shops in Ogden and wanted me to move to Ogden where he could come home after work. That fall, the Hammon farm was sold, so I sold my house to Amasa Hammon, Derlin's brother, and moved to Ogden, living in the Fourth Ward. While there, I taught a group of 11 year old girls in Primary, and in the Spring of 1918, I moved back to

Roy and into Grandma Hammon's home. Grandma Hammon stayed with me for about seven months, Wallace had come home on furlough, and we were all very glad to see him. That Fall, we moved into a home across from the Roy School owned by Harry Hamblin and after about seven months there, Harry sold the place and we had to move again. With the help of my children and the good people of the Roy Ward, I was able to purchase an acre of land across from the Roy School. Martin P. Brown, who was Bishop at the time, gave me \$100.00,

and Charley Rundquist gave me \$50.00, Clarence Hobson, \$25.00 and many others helped me but I was not able to get their names. I bought a two room house and the good neighbors moved it on to my land. The home cost \$600.00, and I was able to pay it all off. I was happy to have a home I could really call my own.

I started to work in the ward again, teaching the Seagull girls in Primary. Ella Hardy was President. I took the janitors work at the churchhouse, with the help of Ruth and Lee, my two youngest children. Wallace had returned home from the Navy and was working away from home. Leonard had gone to work fro my brother-in-law, Ernest Thornton in Rexburg, Idaho. I changed from teaching the Seagulls to the Bluebirds, Bertha Call became President after Ella Hardy moved from the ward. The girls and I made a Bluebird quilt and went to the Stake Convention with it, it was very pretty. This was in 1928. Bertha Call moved away from the ward and I was chosen to act as President of the Primary, which I did for the next five years, getting a great deal of joy out of the work. On March 3rd, 1930, I was released from the Primary and was chosen to be President of the Relief Society. I held this position for almost six years. By now all my children were married but Lee and he was working away from home and I

was left alone and being a widow for nearly twenty years, I decided to get

married again. On January 2nd, 1924, I remarried to a widower, William George Clark, the section foreman on the Union Pacific Railroad at Roy. We moved into the Section house and I rented my house to Lee, who got married in May 1924. I was released from being President of the Relief Society in December 1936, on the account of my husband being ill for so long. I began working again in the Primary, which I did until September 1945 when I was released, as my health would not permit me to do the work any longer. I had the satisfaction and joy of seeing every class of Seagull girls graduate with honors from the Primary and had gone onto the Mutual. I have many little remembrances that the children have given me, which I hold most dear.

My husband and I have taken several wonderful trips to see our children. The first one was to Cleveland, Ohio to visit my daughter Ruth, her husband and baby boy. This was in June 1926. Sometime later, Will's daughter and I returned to Cleveland and while there we took a trip to Kirtland, Ohio.

We had the privilege of going through the Kirtland Temple, the Old Cemetery, where many of the Saints are buried. Many of the names had been washed away from the weather, and had fallen down. We also visited the home of the Prophet, Joseph Smith. It looked like it was almost ready to fall down, but there were still people living in the back part. This was a most wonderful trip. In May 1933, my husband and I took a three month trip, going to Berkeley, California. We first visited my son Leonard and family. From there we went to Ely, Nevada to visit my son Lee and family. We also traveled to Arizona, Colorado, Nebraska and visited with Will's daughter Olive. We then were on the Chicago, where Ruth was living. While there we saw the Worlds Fair and had a

wonderful time. Our next trip was to San Francisco to see the World's Fair. This was in 1939. We spent five days at the fair, and also had a grand visit with Leonard and Florence and their two girls. We then went to Las Vegas to visit Lee and Ada and their two children. Our third trip, in February 1941 was first to Redding, California to visit with Lee. While there we saw the great Shasta Dam that was being built. Then on to Berkeley to visit Leonard, and then to Sacramento to visit with Grant and Denice Hammon. We returned home and took the train back east to visit Olive and to Chicago to visit Ruth. While in Chicago I took very sick and just a few days before we were to start for home. I was not getting any better, but felt like I could make the trip home. I arrived home and was taken to the Hospital where I was diagnosed of having a ruptured appendix. I was very sick, but with a very good Doctor and the prayers of my relations and friends, I was able to return home in two weeks. My Primary class came to visit me and told me that they knew I would live for they had all prayed for me. My testimony had been strengthened by the faith of those dear little girls. And the many blessings I have received. I have been very sick, many times, but each time I have been blessed through faith and prayer. My whole desire while I live is to be able to be of service to others. I have always enjoyed working in the church and hope as long as I live I will be able to do what ever is asked of me to do. I have done many different kinds of work besides church work, taking care of the sick, doing house work, picking fruit, working in the cannery factory, sewing and I also taught the 4-H Club for two years.

Will Clark died on May 22nd 1947, once again leaving Emma as a widow. She resided in Roy for over 70 years, passing away on May 2, 1972, at her modest home in Roy, at the age of 93.

Healed by Faith written by Emma Clark

May 12, 1942

I have seen people healed when they were very sick by being administered to by the Elders. My son, Lee Hammon, when he was only three months old had the Pneumonia and was very bad. He looked like he could not last much longer. The Elders came and administered to him and he began to get better at once, and is alive today, 37 years later, a living witness to faith.

I have been healed from sickness many times my self. Two outstanding instances in the last year. On April 8th I took very sick in Chicago, while visiting my daughter Ruth. After a week being very sick and not getting any better I came home to Roy. I was taken to the hospital and Dr. Budge found that I had a ruptured appendix. The people of Roy and especially the Primary children prayed for me. The Elders administered to me and I returned home in three weeks from the hospital feeling much better. In 11 months I had another attack of appendicitis and had to return to Dee Hospital and was operated on by Dr. Budge. I improved so fast I returned home in 12 days and I am feeling good at this date.

I know the Lord answered the prayers of the good people of Roy for me, especially the Primary children. I am thankful for my life and the many blessings I have received. I am thankful to all.






Lee was named and blessed by his grandfather Levi Byram Hammon. His grandfather had promised his father, Derlin, that if he died he would care for his wife and children, a promise he kept until his own death in 1915.

His youth was spent working with his uncle on the Hammon farm and attending school. He attended the grammar school in Roy. Miss Lambert

(Brown) had a going ball team in the first school. The team included Lee, his cousin Wells Stoker, Horace Thompson, Archie Jones, James Russell, Ralph Thompson and Clarence Starkey.

When Lee was 18 years old he and his cousin Milton West, went to Nevada to work for Uncle Amasa. Hammon. They worked building highways for the summer, being paid at the completion of the summer and returning home with a pocketful of money. When Lee returned home he married Ada Jenkins.

Following their wedding the couple moved in with Lee's mother in Roy. Later they moved to Salt Lake City, where Lee was employed as a salesman for a silk

hosiery company, and then in sales of bathtubs, used during prohibition for the manufacture of illegal alcohol, bathtub gin.

When construction began on Hoover Dam near Las Vegas, Lee found an opportunity to work. For a number of years he found employment as a mechanic and Ada took a job as a waitress at a local eatery. When work on the dam had completed, many of the workers found employment on a new project down the river, where another dam was being constructed. Work also had started on a dam near Redding, California. Lee moved to Redding in 1938 and worked his next major job there. He also worked selling cars during the same time.

In 1953 Lee started a truck repair shop in Anderson, California. His son Don joined him. They soon outgrew their shop in Anderson and moved to a new location in Redding. During the 1960's the business continued to grow and Lee diversified, starting Hammon Trucking Inc., trucking specifically used for hauling road and dam building materials. At the time of his retirement his fleet of trucks numbered 36, semi's and belly-dump trucks.

Lee was active throughout his life in raising horses, a love no doubt he got from his youthful days in Roy. He was an active member of the Shasta County Sheriff's Posse, and was a "life-time" member. His last years were spent traveling. He died in 11 June 1981, after years of rather poor health.

Ada Grace Jenkins

Ada Grace Jenkins was born on 9 Dec. 1906 in Egin, Fremont Co., Idaho,²⁶ a small community just to the east of St. Anthony. Ada grew up of her father's homestead near the center of town and enjoyed the relationship of her grandparents, Francis and Lucy Rawson, and that of her brothers and sisters. On Sundays, Ada and her siblings would attend church with her mother and grandparents, her father not being partial to attending church.

When still a small child Ada's parents, James and Sarah Jenkins moved

to Sugar City, Idaho, where her father worked at the factory, running the boiler and power plants. They remained there a number of years he gaining respect and admiration from his superiors. The family later moved to Ogden, Utah where her father spent his retiring years.

When Ada was about 16 or 17 she met Lee Hammon, a native of Roy, Utah. In 1924 they were married and moved to Salt Lake City. In Salt Lake their two children were born, LaRue, in 1925 and Donald, in 1929. During the early 1930's, her husband already having moved to Las Vegas, where he was engaged in employment working on Hoover Dam, Ada moved herself and two children to be with her husband. Ada got employment as a waitress in Las Vegas.

In late 1938 the Hammon's moved to Redding, California, where Lee began working at Shasta Dam.

About 1945 Lee purchased a piece of property to the south of the town



Donald L Hammon was born 12 Jan. 1927 in Salt Lake City, Utah, the second child of Lee Hammon and Ada Jenkins. His parent were then living 818 Simpson Ave. Don was blessed on March 20, 1927 by his great uncle, Bishop Amasa M. Hammon, receiving his name in recognition of his grandfather D. L.(Derlin Levi) Hammon.

In 1931 his father secured a position as a mechanic at Hoover Dam, and the family later moved to Las Vegas. When this Dam project was completed Don's father found work in Redding, California, where he was a mechanic at Shasta Dam. This was in the winter of 1938. Don attended the old Pine Street School for about a year

and then the family moved to the town site at Shasta Dam.

Don was baptized May 6, 1939 by Elder James Hellenveel, Redding, California, in Stillwater Creek, a small stream near between Redding and Central Valley. He was confirmed on May 7, 1939, by Elder Frank C. Colman, Redding branch, a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter -Day Saints.

Dad attended Toyon school for about two years. The family returned to Redding and he completed his elementary education at Pine St. School. While living in Redding Don would moved around from house to house and finally moved to a house that he father purchased in South Bonnyview. He completed his formal education at Shasta High School, graduating in 1945.

One of the near tragic, but later comical, stories about my father was his winter adventure in 1946. The snow was deep in the mountains and dad and three companions drove up to Lassen Park to ski. Seeing a sign that related a distance of only 18 miles through the park to Viola they decided to ski it, and

one of his companions would drive around to Viola and pick them up. Strapping on their wooden skis they set off, not knowing the road they were on actually took them over the summit and through the park and would not be an easy trip. The road led them to the Sulphur Works, barely inside the park boundary. The trip now took a turn for the worse as night fall was fast approaching and they had only reached the old lodge at the Sulphur Works, only two or three miles from their starting point. The lodge had been abandoned for the winter, but this structure became their shelter for the next two days, finding only the furniture in the abandoned lodge to burn and only a jar of beans to eat. The missing group made the news, statewide, for a number of days.

During the night Don made a slight error while heating himself by the makeshift fire and accidentally got his boots too close to the fire. One of his boot got burnt. This did get him out of the next day's search for a way out of the park. The other two companions skied out onto the road and headed up the summit when the were finally spotted by air rescue. The airplane dropped sandwiches to them. Soon ground rescue made their way into the area and rescued the trio. The story made for a lot of kidding when he got older.

With World War II in progress, Don finished high school and went to enlist in the Navy, in January 1945. He was turned down due to his "sickly condition," do to missing a kidney, which was taken out following a swimming accident as a young boy.

Following his graduation he started working as an apprentice machinist for Gerlinger's Machine Shop and received a trade certificate from the State of California, as a machinist, in 1949. He continued working for Gerlingers until 1953 when he and his father opened Hammon's Bear Truck Service in So. Redding. They ran this business until 1976 when the business was sold. Don continued work as a mechanic and welder until ill health in 1992 forced his retirement.

In 1953 he took up racing cars and was one of the early members of the newly formed Shasta Roadsters. He was manager of the Redding Drag Strip for nearly 20 years. In 1954 he one his first trophy in the Shasta Roadster Reliability Run, winning the race. He continued to race over the next 25 years and had a number of fine cars; racing first at the oval dirt track in Anderson, and finishing his racing career up with *The Redhead*, a streamliner he raced at the Bonneville Salt Flats. His dedication with his hobby made him friends to many local and national racers.

In July 1948 he married Dolores Schrader in Redding. They were the

parents of three children; Cheryl, Dana, and Don.

He was known to many as a friend, and would often give to others only to suffer himself. His light-hearted sense of humor, took even the most serious of issues in a joking and carefree manner. He seldom held a grudge for long, even when his sister cut his finger off, twice. He and LaRue were as close as any brother and sister could be and without her support in his latter days his life would have truly felt empty.

" I was born on Wednesday, January 30, 1929 in the home of my grandparents, Otto and Josephine Schrader, 524 Beatty Street, at 9:00p.m. in Medford, Jackson County, Oregon. I weighed in at 7lbs and was 20" in length. My father's name was Gale Schrader, but he later changed to William Gale. My mother's name was Alta Marie Nyroos.

At the age of one year we moved from Medford, Oregon to Prospect, Oregon, which is approximately 25 miles from Crater Lake National Park. We lived two miles from Prospect itself. This is the place where I started my school. There was a small waiting house for the children

to wait for the school bus. I use to enjoy the times we had riding to and from school on the bus. I started the first grade in September 1935. In Feb. 1941 we moved to Coulee Dam, Washington where I entered the 2nd term of the sixth grade. In May 1943 I received my eighth grade diploma there. During my school years in Coulee Dam I was chosen to help with work on the ration board which they had in the basement of the grade school. I also went to different schools with the school nurse and helped test the eyes of the students. I used to help the teachers of the lower classes in watching their classes at different times. I remember how thrilled I was when the teachers used to ask my help. It made me

feel so grown up. I received a certificate for penmanship after passing the tests that were given. During my Freshman year at Mason City High School, my father and mother separated and my father moved to Redding, California. After visiting him during that summer I promised him I would come and live with him and attend my junior year in Redding. During the summer of 1945 I moved to Redding and entered my junior year in September at Shasta High School. The thing I remember about starting this school was the size of it. I had come from a school with a very small student body and this school was two stories high. In my junior year I received the *Circle S* for the sports I participated in. I took office training and typing because of the vocation I had planned. My typing was above average and because of this my teacher, Mrs. Twaddle, seemed to take such an interest in me and worked with me alot. During my senior year, I got a job with the Record-Searchlight, a newspaper office. On May 29, 1947 I received my High School Diploma from Shasta High School.

Every summer (as a child) I went to Bandon, Oregon on the coast to visit with my grandparents Jack and Mary Nyross. These times were very precious for me for I loved my grandparents very much. I made alot of friends there and use to enjoy the ice cream cones my grandfather bought me at the little store near the beach. Even though the wind always blew there, we had alot of good times swimming in the cold waters of the Pacific Ocean. My grandparents came from Finland and they hardly spoke any English around the house, except to me.

Their first home I visited stands out in mind very plainly even though I was such a small child. The two bedrooms downstairs were connected with a walk in closet. The stairs to the upstairs went up from the bathroom. Up there were three rooms. The first one was fixed up as a sitting room, the next had some storage in it including an old crib of mine then there was another bedroom. Downstairs were the front room dining room and kitchen. The kitchen had a breakfast nook where we used to sit and watch the people go the church next door. In the 1930's most of Bandon was destroyed by fire, including my grandparents home.

My father roomed with a man named Jim Dawson, who was a photographer at the Photography Supply, in Redding. He moved in to another apartment so I could live with him. During my junior year I worked at the Photographic Supply, learning how to develop, print and dry photographs. I also did some tinting.

I started attending the Baptist church, which was across the street. I attended church regularly. I hardly ever attended Sunday school, all through my life I have attended one church or another, usually with a friend. I still had never been baptized. In the summer of 1946, my mother had married an old friend of the family. His sister had been my girl friend ever since the first grade.

My husband had been baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and after we were married in 1948, I started attending Sunday school in the church. When my daughter was just a small baby the missionaries began to call on us. The two missionaries who visited us most frequently were Elder Fugal and Johnson. After discussing the gospel with them and learning more about the church I was baptized. This has really changed my whole life and is a wonderful thing to have happened to me. I was baptized on 4 May 1951 by Elder Kenneth Russell and confirmed May 6, 1951 by Elder Don A. Petersen, Redding Branch, Northern California Mission."

In 1968 mom and dad divorced, after 20 years of marriage. Mom was working for the local "rock and roll" radio station, and in 1973 married Stuart D. Hall. She remained at her home until retiring from the radio station and Stuart from Pacific Bell.

They enjoy traveling and moved for several years to Kenai, Alaska, where mom worked at the Savings and Loan and Stuart guided fisherman along the Kenai River. Chapter 6

The Family of Jesse and Lettie Matilda Hammon Stoker

Lettie Matilda Hammon

y mother was born one of 15 children. She was born in So. Hooper, Davis County, Utah. Hooper, in Weber County, was an old settlement on the shore of the Great Salt Lake and was a place where Mormon pioneers settled in a group. South Hooper was its counter-part

community in Davis County.

South Hooper, although in Davis County, was attended to ecclesiastically by the Bishop in Hooper. He was Lettie's grandfather, Gilbert Belnap. South Hooper was first settled by her other grandfather, Levi Hammon, along with her father, then a young boy. The land was once the herding ground for Senator William Hooper and his unused "herd house" made Levi's first home.

The Weber River and Ogden River came together at Ogden and they dump into the Great Salt Lake near Hooper. This was one of the older Mormon settlements. The settlers pastured their cattle on the shore and down the Great Salt Lake.





The first irrigation water that was used in Weber County was in Hooper, along the mouth of the river where the Ogden and Weber Rivers come together. At Ogden they dump into the Great Salt Lake. Water was taken out of the river to water ground west of Ogden down the Great Salt Lake. About the first farming in the area was around Ogden and down along the Ogden and Weber Rivers.

Lettie was born into a home where love was known in abundance and

idleness was not a part. Her father had bought land in South Hooper and her parents toiled with their hands to make a home of pleasant memories for their children. It was here that Lettie was taught a knowledge of thrift and industry and the principles of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Her mother taught her how to provide the necessities of life for her own family when she was to have one.

Lettie spent her early years in South Hooper. She had two older sisters, who did most of the household chores, so Lettie worked, much of the time, outside the home. She was often found helping her older brother, Derlin, and younger

brother, Amasa. They had to herd the sheep and cows, feed and water the pigs and chickens, gather the eggs and milk the cows. She also took her turn at carrying water from the well and bringing in wood for the stove. She was able to harness the horses and hitch them to the wagon at an early age. She loved to ride horses and spent many hours on horseback.

When she was about 11 years old and Amasa was about 9 1/2 they were sent with a team of horses to plow some land their parents owned in Roy (they still lived in So. Hooper at the time). The two children drove the team and wagon, with another horse tied behind, some food for themselves and hay for the horses. They spent two or three days plowing the field of 80 acres. They used a sulky plow, a plow that had two wheels, with one plow shear between the wheels and a seat above the shear for one person. It was drawn by three horses. The plowing was started on the outside of the field and the rows were made round and round until the center of the field was reached.

Lettie started school in South Hooper and finished four grades there. In the fall of 1894 the family moved to the farm in Roy. She was 11 years old and continued her schooling by attending the Roy Grade School. It was a one roomed school, with a pot bellied stove in the center of the room. Those who sat nearest the stove "roasted" and those farther away weren't warm at all. Since all the grades were in one room there was always someone reciting their lessons while

the others studied. It took a lot of concentration for one to be able to shut eyes and ears to what was going on. Lettie continued at this school and graduated from the 8th grade about 1898.

All of her time was not spent in school nor doing chores. In the winter there was sleigh riding, ice skating, house parties and dances to attend. In the summer the family had picnics in the canyon and excursions to the resort town of Syracuse. There was always a celebration on the 24th of July with homemade ice cream. There was Christmas and most of the childhood joys known to pioneer children.

Lettie wore dresses most of the time, even when doing the farm chores. The dresses were homespun from wool. She wore several petticoats underneath made from a cotton material. Long underwear and long stockings were the rule in the winter months. Shoes were seldom worn in the summer, and the bare feet became toughened by the heat and rocky ground.

After her graduation from the 8th grade, she went to Ogden and stayed with her Aunt Luann Manning and her daughter, Polly. The two girls got jobs in the Troy Laundry. Lettie's job was ironing the white shirts. The shirts had many tiny tucks down the front and were hard to iron because they were heavily starched to make the collars and fronts stiff. The irons used were made of heavy cast iron. They had to be heated on a stove, and changed as they cooled off. It was a hot, tiring job and Lettie didn't like it very much. She did however, become a very good " ironer of shirts."

On 10 July, 1901,² Jesse Stoker and Lettie Matilda Hammon were married at the home of her father in Roy, Utah. Bishop George Kendall performed the ceremony. They later were married in the Salt Lake City Temple and were sealed with their family. A "happy event" relates Aunt Ethel McEntire. "How sweet Let looked in her white ruffled dress. It had ruffles from sleeves to hem of the skirt. Everyone seemed to have a wonderful time. I recall how much fun my brother Derlin and George Kendall had. I can still see Derlin take mother's old coffee mill and wind George up and then turn him loose to sing, dance and play the violin. George and his wife, Dell, sang and danced the cakewalk together. That must have been about it, as I can only remember this and that everybody kissed Aunt Let.³

Lettie knew Jesse Stoker early in her life. His older brother "Wren" had married her older sister Polly when Lettie was five years old. When Lettie was in her early teens she spent some time helping Polly at harvest time and during illness. Jesse and she were "exposed" to each other quite often. He was nine

years older than she and she thought of him at first as just a "big brother." She tells about it in her own words:

Herman ask me to write my love story so here it is: "In 1899 Jesse was home during harvest time. Father had a header. We had the headers, also the thrashers, and quite a lot of men. This was the summer that Glen was born and Mother was not feeling very well. We had a hired girl named Annie Fowler to help cook for the men. One night while there, Jesse came in where we were doing the dishes. Of course I thought he had tried to see her. So when the dishes were through I went to bed and left them alone. I didn't think whom he had in mind. He went back to the sheep. He wrote to her all summer (1900). She told me they were going to get married. She put up her fruit.⁴

When he came home in the fall and ask me to go to the show with him I just thought it was a joke. So I went over to town to my Aunts. I don't know if he came after me or found I wasn't home. But the next day my cousin and I were going down town and who should we meet but Jake Russell and Jesse coming up the street. I could not go back. I was ashamed to meet him so I just walked straight ahead. What did he do but just step in front of me. I just turned around him and never spoke. He said that he made up his mind that he would marry me for sure, which he did. This was the last time I saw him for about six months.⁵

When Polly got sick. I went over to stay with her. I never mentioned this to anyone as I knew Mother and Father would have gave me the dickens for such a trick. I was out in the kitchen working and Polly was in bed. When I turned around there stood Jesse. He just gave me a sneer. I was around there for three or four days when he grabbed me, whirled me around and ask why I was acting so high and mighty. I felt about as little as I could. I didn't have any excuse for acting the way I did. I had never in my life felt like he had any interest in me. He had always been like a big brother to me. In fact I didn't think I was in love with him, but I soon found that I was. I was never sorry. I never did find out if he had ask the other girl to marry him. He would never say. If he did it was a dirty way to do. I never had the chance to ask her but she got married before we did.

The first months of their married life were spent in separation because Jesse was responsible for several herds of sheep and had to be up in the hills. Lettie lived with her sister, Polly and Lorenzo Stoker at their home at 2450 West 5600 South. Lettie's first child, Herman Deloss, was born in this home on November 18, 1901.

Lettie was home alone with her small children. The wind was so strong it shook the little home to such an extent everyone became alarmed. Lettie decided

to go to the neighbors, but as she stepped out the door the wind caught her skirts and sent her flying. She managed to hang on to a small tree and slowly made her way back into the house. Needless to say she did not attempt to leave again as long as the wind continued.

Lettie was a good runner! In her youth and early married years she won many prizes for being the winning runner in races run at ward and community outings and celebrations. Lettie could run like a deer and in her home hung a beautiful picture that she won in a foot race in Roy, also a fancy tea pot and many other prizes. She was looking out her door at her son, Herman, coming from the blacksmith shop leading a colt. It suddenly whirled, threw up its hind feet and kicked Herman in the head. She ran out the door, across the lawn, and jumped over a four-foot board fence that had grapevines growing on it and was at his side in a minute. When asked about the fence she said she couldn't even remember seeing it. Her running ability was put to good use when any one of her children thought they could get away with some misbehavior. Herman recalls such an incident. He can't remember what misdeed provoked his mother, but he did something, which caused his mother to get the willow switch. Herman took off running, with his mother after him. She held the switch in one hand and her long skirts in the other. Herman could see that he wasn't going to outrun her so he quickly scampered up a nearby tree. Needless to say, Lettie climbed the tree and Herman got his "just desserts."6

Speaking of willow switches, there was always a nice stingy green switch laying behind the mirror, on the kitchen wall. Lettie was usually kind and considerate of her children, but when there was deliberate disobedience, the willow switch was put to good use.

At first there was no well on the farm to provide water for personal use. Lettie had to pack water from the Roy "Section House" which was about 1/4 mile away. It was a real chore on washday. In 1902 they dug their own, near 50 ft. deep, well. Jesse curbed it with lumber and enjoyed the clear cool water, which was drawn up by oak buckets tied to a rope run through a pulley, hung at the top of the well. The bucket was later replaced by a pitcher pump. The neighbors for miles around came and hauled from this well. The water was always clear and cold. At their home there was a path instead of a bath, and a pail of water with a dipper in the place of a kitchen sink and faucet. Just inside of the back door stood the old wash bench, with a large wash basin, above which hung a large looking glass. It was here that we were all washed and combed.⁷

Farming was a new experience for Jesse. He worked hard and soon had his farm cleared and planted. Much of the 40 acres was planted into berries (strawberries, raspberries, dewberries, etc.) and fruit trees (peach, apple, pear, cherry and apricot). He also grew tomatoes for the Roy Canning Co. There was a watermelon and cantaloupe patch, too.

About 1907 Lettie started a fruit selling and delivery business in Ogden. A trip was made everyday in the summer to that growing city, except on Sunday. she would load the wagon with crates and baskets of fruit each evening. Early each morning she would hitch the team of horses to the loaded wagon, take Herman and whoever happened to be the baby and make the six mile trip to Ogden. Deliveries were made to grocery stores, private homes and to the railroad depot. (Much of the fruit was shipped to other towns and to Idaho.) They would return home in time for Lettie to prepare dinner for the family and fruit pickers. this practice was continued for about 15 years.

Lettie was of average build. She was 5'7" tall, weighed 135 lbs. her hair was a sandy blond and her eyes were blue. She had a light complexion, was tall and thin until the later years. She gained in weight around 40 and for 20 years then she reduced to her former size around 135 pounds.

Lettie was not what you would call a really good cook or housekeeper, probably because she wasn't exposed to "girls" work in her early life. As soon as her own daughters, Jane and Thelma, were big enough, she turned most of the cooking and housekeeping over to them. She loved to visit. If anyone asked her to go she would leave everything, (dishes on the table or a washing half done), get her hat, and be off for several hours or days, leaving her family to care for themselves.

She was gifted with much ingenuity. If she ever saw something in the line of clothing or crocheting she could duplicate it. She was not afraid to tackle any job or task, whether it be carpentry, wallpaper hanging, cutting hair, soling shoes, electrical repair or reupholstering furniture. She made quilts, braided rugs, crocheted, knitted and tatted. She sewed clothes for herself and her children on a Singer treadle sewing machine. In later years she set up a "doll hospital" in her home in Roy. She repaired dolls of all shapes and sizes, repainting their faces, putting on new hair, replacing broken arms and legs and making new clothes, for dolls brought in by mothers and little girls.

Lettie did not play a musical instrument or sing, but she enjoyed music and saw that the children took piano lessons. The piano came into their home

when Herman was a boy. She did not sing at her work, but could whistle a lively tune. She enjoyed dancing. Jesse never danced but he did not object to her dancing at the ward socials.

Lettie had a special talent Lettie for caring for the sick. She had a good knowledge of nursing and was called upon many times to care for the sick. She nursed her own children through the usual childhood diseases. In 1914 there was an epidemic of typhoid fever and her children, Jane and Leslie, came down with this dread disease while on a camping trip up the canyon at Lost Creek. They immediately turned home and called Mr. Dickson from Ogden to call and see the children.

During the flu epidemic of 1918-1919 she cared for her own family and many of her neighbors. Lettie spent almost the entire winter helping in the homes of the sick. Her own family came down with it early in October while she was in Idaho at a reunion. When she returned home her whole family was sick. Some were out of their heads, others burning with fever and bleeding noses. The reports were coming in that many were dying all over the country with this disease. Losing no time, Lettie set to work and soon had her family on the road to recovery. She then started to go to the neighbors and relatives trying to help out where she could. Many lost their lives and many were sick for a very long time, but Lettie never took the flu or had a sick day during this very hard winter.

She lost two of her own children during this time and because of the strain had a nervous breakdown, the winter and spring of 1920. At the time she was pregnant with Allen. The doctor ordered her to be moved to a quiet place, so Jesse took her to her sister Robena's home in Ogden. Herman, Thelma and Eunice had serious bouts with pneumonia, but under instruction from our capable doctors and her willing labors they were also nursed back to health. She was sick for many months and had to be watched constantly day and night. She suffered from lack of sleep, but could not seem to rest. Having a large family, the many sicknesses she nursed through helped her to learn to be a good practical nurse.

When Lettie's father died in 1915 her mother's health also failed and Martha was no longer able to maintain her own home. The children took her into their homes and cared for her the major part of seven years. Jesse and Lettie were always kind and gentle to her and she spent a good part of this time in their home.

Jesse and Lettie started to farm their Roy acreage. At first there was no well on the farm to provide water for personal use. Lettie had to pack water from

the Roy "Section House" which was about 1/4 mile away. It was a real chore on washday. In 1902 they dug their own 50 ft. well and enjoyed the clear cool water which was drawn up by an old oak bucket hanging on a rope.

Farming was a new experience for Jesse. He worked hard and soon had their farm cleared and planted. While mother prepare breakfast, father loaded the old white top buggy, with the berries that had been picked the previous day and left in the night air to freshen out. A trip was made everyday in the summer to that growing city, except on Sunday. Five in the morning saw her and Herman in the buggy drawn by a team of horses headed for the market. Deliveries were made to grocery stores, private homes and to the railroad depot. Much of the fruit was shipped to other towns and to Idaho. They would return home in time for Lettie to prepare dinner for the family and fruit pickers. This practice was continued for about 15 years.

Lettie wasn't a large woman, but she could handle a team of horses as well as any man. Herman tell of an instance one morning when a she and Herman were making the usual fruit deliveries in Ogden when the team of horses was frightened by a "watering wagon." (In those days the streets were not paved. In order to keep the dust down the streets were sprinkled with water from a wagon equipped with a large tank and a spraying device.) As this water wagon came down the street, spraying its contents around the feet of Lettie's team, the horses bolted. It started to rear in the air and was on verge of a runaway. Lettie very quickly took the reins and held the team steady. One of the grocers, standing nearby, started to help, but another fellow grocer stopped him saying, "leave her be. She can handle them." And she did! Lettie was able to bring the horse under control. Many times she hitched old Minnie to the lighter buggy went to the store and on other errands. Eunice remembers times when she and Ivan kneeled down in front of the buggy, and mother and a companion went to do visiting teaching for the Relief Society.

Along with her delivery business, family rearing, doctoring, she was also able to keep numerous church positions. She was a class teacher in the meetings of the relief society, worked in the Primary Religion class, and was President of the Mutual.

By the time she was in the Mutual they had acquired an automobile,

which Lettie drove and took many of the young people of Roy on various excursions. Many canyon trips were enjoyed by the young people also many Temple excursions where the young people were baptized for the dead. She was also a charter member in Camp 20, Daughters of the Utah Pioneer and was the second captain in this camp, her sister, Janie, being the first. When she was in Burley, Idaho she was chosen county captain in Cassia County and traveled around and organized many camps.


In September of 1910 the county built an electric line to the County line Infirmary (a home for the disabled), which was west of the Stoker farm. Since the went past their places, four families were allowed to "hook on." In order to do this the county paid \$1,000 and each family had to pay \$250, making the cost of the project \$2,000. Jesse was one of the first to sign up to have it put into his home. It was a long time before the line was extended beyond this point. The electricity provided lights for the home so the kerosene lamps were no longer needed. It also brought a new invention into the home, an electric washer. Jesse was so fascinated by it he didn't go out into the field the first day it was put to use and Lettie had the distinction of being the first woman in the area to have an electric washer. It was one of the few things Lettie knew little about and the first day it was put to use Jesse had to stay out of the field while it ran. It was used from then on and many washings were done for the sick ladies in the ward, using this machine.

Lettie was later to learn the danger of electricity, though. One day while she was washing her face in the kitchen, she saw the light bulb was dirty and reached up attempting to wipe it off with the wet cloth. The result was she pulled the entire fixture from the ceiling, but suffered no bad results otherwise.

After Lorenzo Stoker's death in 1920 things began to get discouraging for Jesse and Let. Seemed like the farm didn't hold quite so much appeal. Soon grandmother and then Aunt Polly passed away; some of the older ones had already married, and things began to go down hill. In 1930 Jesse and Let moved from Roy to Morgan, Utah. Jesse was not satisfied in Morgan during the depression. They took their belongings and moved to Burley, Idaho and again engaged in farming.

There, because of the training, she had and the scarcity of money, Lettie began to go out and do nursing. She went into many homes and assisted the doctors to bring many babies into the world and helped out with an epidemics of typhoid fever.

In 1936 Jesse's health began to fail. His heart became bad and he could

no longer do any hard work on the farm. They sold their animals and equipment and returned to Roy. With their money they had, and with help from the family, they again built a modern little four room home, by the side of their son in law and oldest daughter, Jane Venerable, at 2449 So. 2700 West, in Roy. It was just around the corner from the church. At the time they needed a custodian at the church and father took the job and worked at it until he passed away at his home on 30 Oct., 1942.

That night he did finished his ward teaching and returned home. He cut and served himself and Let a piece of watermelon, took the plates back into the kitchen and returned to his chair. While talking to his wife he passed from this life, "in the twinkling of an eye, " and without a struggle. Lettie calmly called her grandchildren and neighbors in and did not show any signs of excitement.

During World War II, Lettie worked in the Ogden Arsenal making ammunition (1942 to 1944). In 1945 she worked as a matron for the Lindquist Mortuary in Ogden, retiring in 1948 at age 65.

Being alone was not a pleasant life for Lettie so on December 21, 1944 she married a man of short acquaintance, Charles Call. They went to California and lived in a lumber camp near her daughter Eunice Southwick. Mr. Call took sick and after Lettie nursed him back to health. They got a divorced in 1945.

Lettie was affectionately known as "Great Grandma Stoker" to her many descendants and as "Aunt Lett" to many friends and neighbors. She maintained her home in Roy until 1972 when she was 89 years old. After that time her health began to fail and she stayed for a short time in a nursing home. The last two years of her life were spent living with some of her children. She passed away quietly on 24th of September 1975 in Roy, at the home of her daughter, Jane Venable. She was 92 years old.

At the time of her passing she had 8 of her 11 children still living. She boasted of her large posterity then numbering; there were 50 grandchildren; 207 great grandchildren and 43 great, great grandchildren. Lettie was proud of her family, having raised 9 of her 11 children to adulthood. Of her five sons, three have been to bishops in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints and of her four daughters, three have been Relief Society presidents and all have held stake assignments.

She likes to travel and has been in nearly every state in the Union including Hawaii. She has been in Canada and Mexico. She recently went to the World's Fair and has traveled around and seer all of her grandchildren.

Her home was plain and simple Her smile was sweet and gay, As she welcomed us in her home On that lovely summer day.

Just make yourselves at home, folks
Don't wait for me to say,
You are all so very welcome
As the lovely flowers in May.

No proud and haughty spirit Abides within her soul, But kind and holy feelings Pent up her heart of gold.

And through the glint in her eyes; Is mirrored her feelings within Where vision lightens with master stroke The influence of greatness to them.

Jesse Stoker

Life on this earth began for Jesse Stoker on the 17th day of July, 1874. He was the 7th child and the 5th son born to John Stoker and Jane Allen and his father's fourteenth child. He was born in Bountiful, Davis County, Utah.

His father, John Stoker, was the bishop of the North Canyon Ward beginning in 1851 and served as patriarch in the Davis Stake. As early as 1869 he served as the president of the Cooperative Mercantile Institution of Bountiful. Lorenzo's mother, Jane Allen, was John's third wife. They had eight children; three girls and five boys. Four of the children died in infancy. Their names were: Clarissa, Jude, Albert and Harriet Eunice. The other four grew to adulthood.

Their names were: Mary Ann, Henry, Lorenzo and Jesse.

Soon after Jesse's third birthday his mother Jane Allen Stoker died (5 August, 1877). He was too young at the time to remember anything about his mother.

For the next four years he stayed close to his father and went with him to the homes of his other wives. About one month before his seventh birthday (June, 1881) he remembers being at the well with his father. Suddenly his father fell to the ground suffering from a stroke. His father died on June 11, leaving him an orphan.

He had older brothers and sisters, but for some reason he did not make his home with any of them at this tragic time in his life. Bishop Stoker's second wife, Harriet Susan Willis Stoker, took him into her home and gave him a mother's love.

In order to help pay for his keep he did chores around the neighborhood. He went too school only when work did not interfere. The result was that he had a total of about four years of formal schooling.

When he was still a boy of about 9 or 10 years old. he herded cows on the hills east of Bountiful during the summer months. With a lunch of homemade bread and cheese, he would trail the cows barefoot through the sand and prickly pears to the grazing grounds. Three other boys helped him. They played together on the hillside but kept a sharp eye on the cows so they would not stray away. there were about 100 cows in the community herd and the boys were paid about 50 cents a month for each cow. This would amount to \$50 a month. Each boy's share was \$12.50 a month. At the age of 13 Jesse was offered a job herding sheep for the Desert Livestock Co. He took the job and this ended his years of formal schooling. However, he did have a love for books and figures so during the next number of years he filled his spare time with reading and studying. By the time he was an adult he had a good knowledge of things.

In 1888 his older brother, Lorenzo, married Polly Hammon and they made their home in Preston, Idaho. From that time on Jesse spent much time with his brother and his wife, living in their home when the winter indifference forced him to remain idle.

Jesse continued to herd sheep; a job which took him from the desert west of the Great Salt Lake to Soda Springs, Idaho. When his father's estate was finally settled, Jesse, became a ward of Lorenzo and spent his winters with them. The unwavering living in the outdoor gave Jess a great appreciation for nature.

He marveled at the beauty of what God had created. He loved the hills, trees, sparkling streams, wild flowers, birds and clear blue skies.

Once in a while he would find a dead tree where wild bees had left a store of honey. Such a find ensured a treat made up of sourdough boy. They needed a good sheep man and it wasn't long until Jesse became their foreman. He was responsible for several large herds of sheep and the men who herded them. Their grazing land was around Soda Springs, Idaho. In the winter they fed the sheep near Tremonton, Utah.

During the time Jesse spent with his brother, he became acquainted with Polly's sister Lettie. She was slim and blond and came to help Polly in times of harvest and illness. Jesse made up his mind to marry her and after a short courtship they were married on July 10, 1901 by Bishop George Kendall. On the 20th of December, 1911 the family made a trip to the Salt Lake Temple where Jesse and Lettie received their endowments and the family was sealed.

Mr. Hamblin and Mr. Mercer owned 160 acres of farm land in Roy, Utah. Through Jesse, the men became acquainted with Wren and arrangements were made for him to run the farm. Jesse stayed with the sheep. The two men, Wren and Jesse, worked out a partnership where they took part of their pay in sheep. They soon had a good sized herd of their own, so about 1900 they formed their own sheep company, Stoker Brothers Sheep Co. The rented land was used to raise more tomatoes, hay and grain and sugar beets. In 1902 the two brothers sold the sheep, gave up the rented farm, and purchased 80 acres of their own. Wren and Jesse cleared the land of sage brush and made irrigation ditches, they made a trip into the east canyon, brought back box elder trees and planted them for shade and as a windbreak. They divided the land into two 40 acre farms and each built a home on their portion. All of Jesse's and Lettie's children were born in this home except Herman. The added income gained from this venture made it possible for Jesse and Lettie to completely pay for their 40 acres in 1910.

Jess ran the sheep until after his daughter Janie was born. Lettie expressed it almost as an mandate; "I decided if we had to live apart all the time it wasn't worth it." 10

The first residence on the 40 acres was a two room house. At first their furniture consisted of a bed, table and chairs, a cupboard, wash stand, looking glass, a folding bed and a cook stove. For light they had kerosene lamps which hung from the ceiling. For bathing they used a wooden tub which when not in use had to be set outside and filled with water to keep the wood from drying out and allowing the tub to leak. The bathroom facility was the old family "back house"

with the "rumble seat" for the baby. Much of the land south of their farm was not under cultivation. It was dry in the summer and dust often billowed up from it when the wind blew. Lettie hand made the rag rugs for the bedrooms and the kitchen was bare wood. The floor was hard to keep clean so Lettie was glad to get a piece of linoleum in later years. She mopped it with milk to give it a shine. Lettie hand made the rag rugs for the bedrooms and the kitchen was bare wood.

The added income and enlarging family also forced Jesse, by 1910, to enlarge their house. They built an two additional rooms on to their home. The old bedroom was made into two bedrooms. The old kitchen became the parlor. The new addition contained a kitchen, and dining room and two porches.


There was no refrigeration in those days so food was preserved by other means. A large cellar was made close to the back door of the house. Apples, carrots, squash and potatoes were stored there. A clean, covered shelf was used as a milk shelf in the summer. The pans of milk were placed there because it was cool. The cream was skimmed off each day and the milk used for drinking and cooking. After several days there was as slaughtered the meat was cut up and placed in a barrel of salt brine to preserve it. after a period of time the meat would be removed and allowed to dry off. In order to make it fit to eat, the meat had to be boiled to bring out the salty taste. After the salt was removed the meat was sliced and fried or roasted.

In 1912 a great land deal came to the ears of Jess and Lett. Lettie relates that " a bunch of land sharks came along, with a get rich company." Uncle Amasa, Jesse and Lett's father all fell into the deal. "We borrowed \$1500.00 on our place. Put it in as our share of the land. We never looked at the deeds or contract. We had 1500 acres of land plowed and put into alfalfa. Hired men to do the job about the time we were looking for a crop to pay, we found we had only an option on the land. It had gone back to the promoters. We were left holding the sack. With a note at the bank for \$13,000.00 with only 8 of us suckers attacked. We took it to the Supreme court. We lost and payed dear for the rest of cur lives." Her moral lesson she relates as: " if you ever sign anything, look it over."

The years went swiftly by and more children came to bless the home. Eunice was born in 1912; Ivan in 1914. Two more boys were born, Claud in 1918 and Alf in 1919 but both died when just a day or two old. In 1920 Allen was born and Verda came in 1922. This made a total of 9 living children all dwelling together in the five room house. During the summer the older boys slept outside under the trees or in the hay loft of the barn. In the winter a folding bed

was opened up in the parlor for the boys use. The girls all shared one of the bedrooms and the small children slept in the parents bedroom.

As a young man Jesse had thick, dark brown hair and soft brown eyes, although in later years his hair thinned and turned gray. He was 5'11" tall, weighed about 160 lbs. He wore a size 11 shoe. Later in life he gained a lot of weight and at one time weighed 240 lbs. He developed a protruding "bay window" in front. His hands were short and

thick with "stubby" fingers. His deep brown eyes always had a sparkle even though in later years an injury caused one eye to have a cloudy spot on its surface. The injury was caused from a weed seed which got in his eye. His other eye was what is known as a "lazy eye" and had never functioned properly from his youth. After the injury his sight was impaired and he could not do much reading.

His usual working attire was a pair of faded blue bib overalls, a chambray shirt and work shoes. He usually wore an for dinner and a nap. He could drop off to sleep quickly, snore for about 15 minutes, then wake up rested and ready to go back to work. The field work usually ended at 5 p.m. for there were chores to be done. He retired to his bed early to get a good night's rest.

There was always plenty of work on the farm to keep the children busy: cows to milk; horses, pigs and chickens to feed; fruit to be picked; the garden to weed and irrigate, tomatoes to pick for the cannery; meals to be brought in; the

water bucket to fill; hay to cut and haul; beets to thin and hoe, etc., etc.

Jesse was a soft spoken man. He did not like harsh voices and very seldom spoke cross to his wife or children. His children learned early in life, however, that when he said they could not do a thing he meant it. There was no need to try to get him to change his mind.

Christmas for the family meant that Santa would make his traditional visit. There was no Christmas tree, but stockings were hung up on Christmas Eve. The next morning each stocking would hold a toy, an orange, some hardtack candy and some nuts. Christmas dinner was usually shared with visiting relatives. Fourth of July celebration was usually begun with a bang! About 4 a.m. Uncle Wren Stoker would set a charge of gun powder under a large iron anvil, set a match to the powder, and blow it up into the air. The resulting explosion would arouse the whole community. Also in connection with the celebration there was a baseball game and a family picnic with a freezer full of homemade ice cream.

Winter time cut down the chores to some extent but then school was in session and the children had homework to prepare. All the children attended the Roy School, the same one their mother had attended. There was a bigger enrollment, however, and a new brick school had been built to replace the old wooden structure. All the children graduated from the 8th grade at this school. Some went on to school at the Weber High School and had 12 years of schooling.

Jesse continuing love for the mountains and outdoors, so that he wanted his family to enjoy them too. Summer time brought camping time. A covered wagon and horses were used to haul the family and provisions up into the Canyon. Relatives would bring their wagons and families along also. the result was a big family reunion. The trip took about four hours so an early start was the order of the day. A choice, shady spot, near a stream was selected for camp. Everyone set to work putting up camp. Wood was gathered for the cook fires, and beds were made up of quilts and blankets placed on piles of hay on the ground. Some beds were made up in the covered wagon. Jesse would ride a horse to a nearby sheep camp and purchase a lamb for slaughter. The fresh meat would be cut up and cooked over the campfire as needed, there was always one meal prepared by Jesse; a meal of lamb stew and sourdough biscuits, a treat he learned during his years.

The children were expected to attend Sunday School and Primary. They were encouraged to accept assignments in the ward. Most all of the older children were baptized during the summer months rather than on their 8th birthday because there was water available in the canal.

Jesse farmed most of his married life (1902-1936). He lost his home and farm in Roy during the depression in 1932, because of some bad investments. For the next four years he strained to "keep the fire burning." He would always see something to do beyond his everyday chores. He planted flowers around the Church and white-washed the dirty, black furnace room.

In time of sickness the priesthood was used to give special blessings. Both Jesse and Lettie worked in the ward and set an example for their children. Many years later three of their five sons became bishops; Herman, Leslie and Lee. Their daughters were active in Relief Society, Primary and M.I.A.

In the fall of 1942 he began to prepare for winter. He put the garden tools away and filled the shed with wood and coal. He cleaned up the dead leaves and flowers around his home and Church. They were together in their new home for six years. In October of 1942 Jesse died of a sudden heart attack, after 41 years of marriage.

Summary¹⁵

Known as Uncle Jess and Aunt Let, their home has always been a welcome place for all of their many relatives and friends also the stranger that was within their gates.

I remember this special couple with many fond memories. I vaguely remember the old pioneer home in Roy where Uncle Lee and Aunt Ethel were given a wedding shower. I remember the baby doll they unwrapped which had mustard in its diaper.

I remember visiting them in Morgan; Verda, my sister Shirley and I played house on an old barn door which lay flat upon the ground. I remember the house in Springdale, Idaho, which had an upstairs. We spent many hours playing "bride" with old lace curtains. I remember the day and night of flooding at the house in "View," mainly because my father was gone for a long worrisome time.

I remember the "new" home in Roy and the special cake I baked for Grandpa on his 66th birthday.

I remember the phone call I received in the girls dorm at Albion State Normal School, that night in October 1942, telling me of Grandpa's death. I remember being a flower girl at his funeral and the emptiness I felt.

I remember Grandma's faithful attendance at all our family reunions and temple marriages. I was in Hawaii with my husband when the phone call came notifying us of her passing in September, 1975. There was no way for us to return

ahead of schedule so I missed being in attendance at her funeral, but my thoughts and memories were there.

I will be forever grateful for the heritage these two good people have given me. I am thankful for their pioneer spirit and fortitude which made this land a lovely place to be. Most of all I thank them for raising my good father, Herman Deloss Stoker.

Life Sketch of Herman Deloss Stoker

by his daughter, Ora Stoker Whittier

Herman Deloss Stoker was born at the very beginning of the 20th century on November 18, 1901 in Roy, Weber Co., Utah to Jesse Stoker and Lettie Matilda Hammon. He was the oldest child in a family of eleven children, seven boys and four girls.

His great-grandparents made their way across the plains from Nauvoo to the Salt Lake Valley in 1851 and were some of the first pioneers to settle in the Hooper area of Utah.

Herman was two years old when his parents purchased a 40 acre plot just east of the Oregon Short Line Railroad in Roy. They built a small two room house, dug a well, planted fruit trees, and a large vegetable garden. Dad grew up on the farm learning all the skills needed to make the land productive. He learned to work hard, to take pride in being a farmer and to be of help to his father and mother.

Dad's formal schooling began when he was almost seven years old. A year earlier he had severe pneumonia and was unable to start the first grade with his friends. School work was easy for him and soon after the beginning of his third grade year, he was advanced to the fourth grade.

There were nine students in the Roy 8th grade graduating class of 1915. Dad was one of them. The next year he attended the Weber Academy in Ogden. At the end of the year he decided he had had enough schooling. He went to work in the Roy Canning Factory and advanced from stacking empty cans to loading wooden crates full of canned tomatoes onto railroad cars to be shipped overseas during World War I.

At a church dance in 1922, he and his friend, Dode Neilson, double dated two girls from Riverdale. Dad's date was Florence Dalton. His friend's date was Minnie Ora Child. At the end of the dance they traded dates and Dad took Minnie home. They dated steadily from then on, and at Christmas time Herman gave Minnie a diamond. They were married April 18, 1923 in the Salt Lake Temple.

Dad had a job with the railroad until after Ora was born in January 1924. During the next five years three more children were born in Roy; Shirley in 1925, Deloss in September of 1927 and Lloyd on Thanksgiving Day of 1929.

Those five years brought a number of changes in their financial affairs. After Dad was laid off by the railroad he tried his hand at farming. In the spring of 1925 he began buying a farm from a Mrs. Edward Bell. The ground was very sandy and the wind blew out the crops. He gave that up after one year. In the spring of 1926 he made arrangements to rent a farm adjacent to his parent's. An early frost killed his tomato crop. The next three years were better and he had enough to buy a team of sorrel horses and two Jersey cows. In the spring of 1930 he once again planted his tomato crop. All went well until an early blight infested his fields. He earned enough from his hay and pea crops to pay the rent, but decided he would move his family to Idaho.

His old schoolmate, Dode Neilson, made arrangements for him to bring his family to Lava Hot Springs. On October 30, 1930 Dad loaded a wagon with machinery, hitched a pair of young colts to the wagon and headed toward Idaho. Thanks to the help of a Good Samaritans, who came to his aid along the way, he was able to arrive in Lava Hot Springs six days later. With the help of his dad and Jess Stevens, a brother-in-law, the family and furniture were moved into a house located on the banks of a creek about four miles south of Lava.

A beautiful crop of potatoes filled the sod cellar, but when spring came there was no market. So the Lava adventure lasted one year. With the help of his Aunt Rhoda and Uncle Ursel Taylor, Dad made arrangements to move to Burley, Idaho. Once again he began the move with his team and wagon. It was the 14th of February. The ground was snow covered and the road was icy. His younger brother, Ivan, came along to help him herd his cows and heifers. They were six days and five nights on the trail with the temperature near twenty below zero most of the time. Dad's brother, Lee, brought the family and furniture in a rented truck.

The first home in Burley was located in Unity. It was in this house that Vaughn was born in May of 1932. An opportunity came the next spring to move into a home with electricity in View on another rented farm. Times were a little better. Dad was able to buy a second hand car, a radio, some more milk cows and some farm machinery. The family lived in View for five years. Lynn was born here in 1935.

In the spring of 1938 a move was made to a home and farm west of Unity. This home had electricity and a bathroom! Carol was born that fall and two years later in 1940 Bob was born. Farm prices were pretty good, the cows produced milk enough to sell for the purchase of food and clothes. In 1940 Dad and Lee purchased the McCaslin dairy in Burley and began bottling the milk from their own cows to sell in the stores and restaurants. At first the bottles were filled from a separator bowl, and the cardboard caps put on by pressing down with an empty salt shaker. Not long after they started the dairy operation the city of Burley passed a food safety ordinance and purchase of modern bottling machines was necessary.

In 1943 Dad made arrangement to buy some land along Highway 30 in Unity. It had a small home which wasn't the best for a family of ten, but the land had hills which were ideal for establishing a large dairy operation. The family moved into the small home and over the next year, with the help of his brothers, and brothers-in-law, Dad built a brick home and a milk processing plant which housed the first pasteurizer ever used in the Burley area.

In 1946 Lee moved to Oregon and the milk processing facility was sold to Jess Yarrington, but Dad kept his dairy cows and sold milk to him. The family was growing up; all the children graduated from Burley High School. Some went on to college, others served in the mission field, two served in the military and one by one each married a choice companion in the Idaho Falls Temple.

Dad loved the Gospel of Jesus Christ. all his life he served the Lord in everyday life as well as in church callings. In October of 1948 he was sustained as the bishop of the Unity Ward. He along with his counselors, Wade Baker and Morris Baker, helped the ward members build and dedicate a meeting house. He was released as bishop in April of 1953 having served nearly five years. After his release he served in various church positions on a ward and stake level.

By 1963 Dad and Mom were alone in the home they had built in the 1940's. It was time to fill a long time desire to go on a mission, they served together for two years in the Western States Mission from 1963 to 1965. Soon after their return Dad retired from the dairy and farming operation. He worked as custodian of the Unity Church for several years and took great pride in making it a House of the Lord. When he reached his 70th birthday he retired again in order to spend more time with Mom in doing their genealogical research and temple work. They spent a number of winters in the Salt Lake area making use of the library there. They also spent a number of years doing German extraction in the Burley Stake.

Dad enjoyed good music. He had a good singing voice and always participated in the ward choir and male quartets. He especially enjoyed singing with his sons. He could sing either bass or tenor, so he was often in demand. He loved to hear his children and grandchildren sing or play musical instruments. He often mentioned how he learned to sing, "Jesus Wants Me For A Sunbeam" as very young child.

In 1981 Dad lost his sweetheart of 58 years. He sought to find comfort and companionship in various ways. He loved to do temple work and dedicated himself to spending many hours and days in the Logan Temple.

In 1987 he married Alta Murri in the Logan Temple. She and Dad settled into the old home in Unity and traveled to the Logan Temple in Wallace Baker's van. After a time the trip was too much for their aging bodies, they moved to Logan, where they were able to continue going to the temple without the two and one half hour ride. In 1990 their health began to fail and in 1991 Alta had to be hospitalized. Dad was not able to care for himself so, for a year her took turns living with each of his eight children. The moving and constant change was hard on him. In December of 1992 the family helped him settle into a retirement center near his daughter, Carol, in Bountiful. He was just getting used to his new surroundings when his health took a turn for the worse. He was hospitalized in Ogden for a week, then transferred to a nursing home in Bountiful. His stay there lasted for only two days. He passed away quietly with loved one around his bed

on Sunday afternoon, March 28, 1993, having lived upon this earth for more than 91 years.

Jane Stoker Venable

I was born on the cold, bleak morning of January 1, 1904, in the home of my parents and without the help of a doctor. My father was Jesse Stoker, a son of Bishop John Stoker, who was the first bishop of Bountiful. His mother was Jane Allen, the third polygamist wife of John Stoker.

My mother was Lettie Matilda Hammon, a daughter of Levi Byram Hammon and Martha Jane Belnap. They were among the first families to settle in Roy.

I was the second child to be born to my parents. Herman was just over two years old and I was the first girl. Both of my grandmothers had the name of "Jane" and each of my parents had a sister named Jane so I began to be called by that name. However, I was not officially blessed until the summer when I was blessed under the shade of the trees in my grandfather Hammon's yard.

I was given the name of Matilda Jane, but I think it should have been "Calamity Jane" for I was one of those that might have helped open Pandora's box and had many encounters with sickness in my life.

Uncle Lorenzo and my father had been in business and had a number of sheep. They bought 80 acres of land in Roy and divided the land and built homes near each other. My father built a house consisting of two large rooms

with a pantry and a clothes closet with more rooms to be added through the years. This was to be my home for the first twenty years of my life or until I was married. There were nine more children born into our family, making eleven with Herman and myself.

Our home in Roy was a very happy home and many fond memories go through my mind. We were taught many things. We were not allowed to make a lot of noise for father spoke in soft tones and expected us to do likewise. He was the "head" of the house and when he told us to do something we did it with no back-talk. Mother was easier to sway and if you coaxed long enough, she may give in, but when father said, "No," it meant "No!"

Our farm was planted to fruit trees and berries of every kind, from which we made our living. There was no electricity and our lights were coal-oil lamps

and lanterns. There was no culinary water on the place and it had to be carried from the section house about a quarter of a mile away.

Our transportation consisted of
horse and buggy and
later by a "Ludlow,"
which was a buggy
with two seats and
curtains that you could
let down at the sides
so that rain and wind
could not come in.

The first washing machine mother had was one with a wheel on the side. We had to take turns at the wheel to

"swish" the clothes and run them through a hand wringer.

Many are the hours I spent in the kitchen cooking on our old Monarch range, washing dishes and ironing. When I was 11 or 12 years old, I learned to

make bread. We baked 14 loaves every-other day and sometimes baking powder biscuits in between.

I remember when the electricity was brought to Roy. My mother had the first electric washer and what a joy it was! She was afraid of it and she made Father stay in the house the first time she used it.

Our home was one of parties and good times. We were a close family and our relatives visited often. We always hurried to get the evening dishes done and out of the way so we could get with our neighbors and friends to sing, play games or get our "lessons" together. Sometimes we made candy, popcorn or enjoyed the apples we had put in the cellar for winter.

I have nothing but happy memories of my home life. We were a large family, but we loved each other and shared what we had.

My schooling began in the first schoolhouse that was built in Roy. Our school room had a pot-bellied stove in the middle of the room and the teacher fed it fuel as was needed. There was a stand in the corner of the room and on it was a water bucket and tin cup which we all drank out of. There was a wash basin

and many times when we were very cold, our teacher would have us put our hands in snow before we went to the stove to warm them.

We all wore homemade, knitted, long stockings that our mother or grandmother had knitted. We also wore leggings that buttoned up the side to help keep us warm. There were no snow ploughs and we walked everywhere in the snow. It seemed to me the snow was very deep for it came to the bottom of my skirts.

There were not many of the boys and girls who went beyond the eighth grade. We had to pass a test to graduate. The tests took about a week and if you didn't pass, you had to take the eighth grade over again. After my graduation from eighth grade, I went into Ogden to school and was able to graduate from high school.

There were no child labor laws then and when you got out of school you could get a job and go to work. There were many opportunities for work in those days. There were four canning factories in Roy and I worked in the factory when I was eleven years old. Our pay was ten cents an hour and we worked ten hours to earn a dollar a day. After high school, I worked as a cook at the Weber County Infirmary.

My courting took place at home. Marvin and I were married in the Salt Lake Temple, but our wedding reception was held in our home where a hot supper was served to many guests. Marvin and I went together for nearly three years and we "ironed-out" many things that could have been difficulties later on. He told me he would like to have his meals on time and I told him he was to build the fires, empty the ashes, bring in the wood, coal, water and the food. We both have kept our part of the contract, so no trouble there. I wanted to be married in the temple and raise a family. No trouble there. We both handled the money. He brought it home and I put it in the bank and we both spent it where it was needed.

I have my first time to ever say I was sick when I wasn't given comfort and love and taken care of in kindness. I have been told many times not to work so hard and I could rest if I felt like it.

I have used the garden-stuff he has grown, baked most of the bread we have eaten, done my own laundry and helped in any way I could. He has swept floors if I was ill, washed dishes if I was not able to and helped me raised our family.

I do not read and let my work go, but I love to read good books to relax... no fiction, though.

Jane Stoker Venable passed away on 14 Oct. 1983, in Layton, Davis, UT.

guess I've had a most interesting life. I born 28 was December 1905 at Weber Roy, County, Utah, the third child in the Stoker family. Herman is the first, then Jane, then I came along third. I am the third child of eleven children.

I spent most of the first part of my life at Roy, Utah in Weber County. I went through the first eight grades in Roy in the Weber County school system.

I don't remember much about my life before going to school, although I do remember when I was about four or five years old. One of the things I do remember is my Uncle Frank Leslie Hammon, my mother's brother. My mother named me Leslie after Uncle Frank.

My father was Jesse Stoker and he had kind of an unfortunate life. His mother died when he was three years old and his father died when he was seven. My father was the last son of John Stoker ad his wife Jane Allen. He lived with Uncle Ren after Ren married Polly Hammon. He was then about 9 years old. They worked together until he married my mother Lettie Hammon, Polly's younger sister.

They worked together in the sheep business. My father spent a lot of time with the sheep until finally they bought 80 acres in Roy. It had a lot of sagebrush, sand and gravel hills. My father later sold some of his land to Uncle Jedediah Hammon, who was my grandfather's brother. They (Ren, Jess and Jed) had built three houses on the land and I was born on that 80 acres in Roy.

I started school when I was six years old at Roy, and I worked on the farm until I got married. I married Annie Weston, who moved into Roy from Ogden. She was born in Ogden and her father had bought 20 acres in Roy when she was four years old.

I met her, I suppose, at Sunday School, for the first time. We started school in 1911 in the grade school in Roy and then went to Weber Normal College in Ogden, which was the high school. It was owned and operated by the church until 1923 when they closed the high school. Weber County built their first high school in 1927. The last year I went to high School was in 1924 at Ogden High School. The county kids went to Ogden High School after the church shut down their school. Weber County had to pay for our going to Ogden High School until we got one built.

Annie and I got married in 1925, October the 7th in the Salt Lake Temple. We lived in Ogden for a few years and I started working as a carpenter in Ogden and served there until I learned the trade. Finally I got to be tradesman. We had our first child, Gene, in Ogden. Dale, our second son, was born in Ogden in 1928 and our third child, Joyce, in Ogden in 1930. We moved out to Roy and our second daughter, Nell, was born in a house we rented from Alfred Neilsen, who had an orchard and a house there. He lived in Ogden so we rented his house on his farm. Nell was born January 5, 1932, at the time of the great depression.

There wasn't much work in the whole United States and everybody was scratching to make a living. Then we had Mary, in 1936, our third daughter. I was then working in Wyoming, helping build a hospital in Evanston and came down to Utah every weekend. I generally rode the Union Pacific. I was working for George A. Whitmeyer and Sons, a big contractor, from Ogden. I worked for them for several years and built quite a lot of buildings and things. Leslie, our third son, was born in 1939. Ann, our next child, was born in Ogden, She was our seventh child. Claude, our last son, was born in Oregon in 1946.

We moved to Nyssa, Oregon and there was a sugar factory there called the Owhyee Project. The Owhyee Dam was built and there was 60,000 acres put under irrigation. We worked around there and built things for people. We bought

a 40 acres farm. We lived there five years.

In 1934 I was a seventy in the Church and was made one of the seven presidents of the quorum. We had a fund of \$100.00 in the bank and because of the Great Depression there wasn't much money available and there weren't many missionaries going out in the field. The presidents of the seventies quorum, including myself, had a meeting and decided that we should try to figure out whom we could call on a mission and offer them the \$100.00 for a short term mission. We decided that the bishopric and the two oldest presidents would meet and talk about calling someone on the mission. Being the youngest of the seven presidents, I smiled and said I'll see you later. I went home leaving them to talk about it, chose somebody and have another meeting. That was a Sunday and I had no more gotten home and in bed when a knock came on our door. I went to the door and her was the bishop, his counselors and one of the seven presidents. The bishop said they had commissioned to come over to my house and ask me if I would go on the mission. (Well, of course, we got out of bed and pulled our clothes and went out being quite surprised.) I told the bishop that I would wait until Tuesday, which was MIA night, and tell him then if I would or would not go on the mission. We talked it over until pretty late that night.

At that time we had a stack of hay in the back yard, a little barn and a cow, a pig pen and a couple of pigs. We had a few chickens and a fruit cellar and a lot of food storage. This was the first of October or the last of September. We had always taught to store food in the winter and put a little money away to pay the light bill and one thing or another, because there wouldn't be much working the winter and we would just stay home and eat our food and wait till Spring.

The State Industrial School was at Ogden and we were building a new building there. Two more days and we would have that job done and wouldn't have nay more work until Spring. So I got my mission call and everything worked out for a certain day. I was to leave the first of November and stay until April. I got the \$100.00 and bought \$100.00 worth of traveler's checks. I had a little money to leave at home, but not much. We had quite a lot of money handed to us from different people in the ward... I was called to the Western States Mission in Denver. There was a train leaving Ogden every night about 7 or 8 in the morning and it went all night arriving in Denver at 8 in the morning. I got on the train in Roy and went down to Salt Lake.

They kept me two days in Salt Lake, at the mission home, to train me a little and get me organized. There were six of us going to Denver. We stayed in the same rooms in the mission home. The mission home was two or three old

mansions just inside the Eagle Gate. They put two girls that were going to Denver in one room and the four boys in another room. I think about the first of November we were on the train, at night, there in Salt Lake City, and arrived in Denver at daylight, in the morning. They later sent the whole bunch of us to Omaha to operate.

There we were. We had pretty near all of Nebraska and half of Kansas and about half of Iowa, including Council Bluffs. We just had to wonder all over and were spread pretty thin. We would go out of town without purse or script, hitchhike half way to Nebraska and half way over into Iowa. We went to the capitol city of Nebraska and out to Council Bluffs, Iowa. We stayed with the Saint and we ordained a lot of deacons and set apart branch presidents.....

We were sent a letter by President Heber J. Grant, while we were there. He was president of the church then. He wanted to know if we would visit the city commissioners of Omaha and ask them if we could get possession of the Old Mormon Cemetery at Florence, Nebraska. Florence is actually North Omaha. This cemetery was the old Winter Quarters Cemetery.

We spent some time out there digging around finding cornerstone stakes and markers. We found quite a few headstones there and some old iron fences around some of the graves. There are about 600 Mormons buried there and about another couple of hundred buried there after the Mormons vacated the place. We found out there as a man named Webber, who homesteaded the ground, that included the ten acre cemetery. This ten acres was Indian Territory when the Mormons lived there. They had permission from Chief Omaha to bury their dead on this knoll above the Missouri River. When the Mormons left, this man Webber, Homesteaded a section of land that included the ten acres cemetery. We finally found out that the title to the ground started out with this man. He ran a flour mill there.

We found out that this was not even part of the United States when the Mormons used it as a cemetery. (After a meeting with to town and county, attended by President Heber J. Grant, the motion was to allow the church to take over the cemetery.)

We labored mostly in the better parts of Omaha. Omaha had a lot of Catholics and a lot of Jews. They were all quite difficult to do missionary work with. Jews were all friendly to us, however the Catholic were not. But we got into a lot of homes and we enjoyed them.

One time a Priest in a big Catholic Church invited is into his library. Three of us went, Elder Hart, Elder Andress and myself. After he got talking, he

started to ask us questions. We got started cornering him on so many things and he said; "where did you go to ministerial school?". We said we didn't. "How did you learn so much as you know about the scriptures?" We said we just went to church all our life a we studied in our church school, called seminary, then we were sent out here to preach. He said; "Well, your scriptures are sure.. what kind of Bible are your using?" We showed him the Book of Mormon. Then he got mad and he started telling us off about how evil we were and false and listening to the devil. So we told him we would leave. He said no to come back; just stay away from him because he didn't want us around. We often thought about that. How smart he though we were, how wise and how well we knew our scriptures and how well we quoted them. Of course, the Book of Mormon upheld the Bible a lot and the information in there was just what he knew to be true and what we knew to be true, but he wouldn't accept it......

I came back to Utah the first of April. They said it would be all right to come back for General Conference. I remember I cam home on the Union Pacific and it was quite a treat to get back into the mountains.... My wife and my children came down to the Ogden Depot to meet us. The boys grinned and looked at me. They hadn't seen me for six months. The girls, there shyed back, Nell was a bit scared, I guess she didn't know her dad, but we soon got along all right. When I got down to home I still had a bit of hay left and mom had quite a lot of food stuff left in the cellar. We had quite a home coming. I went out looking for work the next day or two.

When I went down to Whitmeyer's office a couple of days after I got home, George said, "Hey, I was about to call you." I hadn't had a job and he said "What have you been doing all winter?" I said I had been on a mission. He said he didn't know I had been gone... so I had a job as soon as I got back.

They were going to build a new high school in Ogden and it was going to cost a million dollars. Whitmeyer bid it and was the successful bidder. Some other me had bid on the school for the footing and the grading. Christiansen Brothers, in Salt Lake, were the successful bidders for those jobs. George told me to go down and get a job with Christiansen and then when he bid the foundation he was sure he would get that, he was sure he would get that, he would bid the main school. He just said he was going to build the school house.

So I went to Christiansen's and asked them if I could get a job and they gave me a job. They hired me as a carpenter foreman and I helped put the footings in and level it out. Then the government money came through and people voted to obligate the school board on a government loan and that they would be

able to let bids for the rest of the school house. We built the footings then it was a few months until they let out the contract on the main foundation and such. In the meantime Whitmeyer got this contract in Evanston, on a building for the criminally insane. We went up there and built that building and came back to Ogden to bid the school house and got it. Since I had helped put in the footings I knew all the layout and everything, they put me as foreman over the building.

The government started building Hill Field. I became a superintendent of that job at Hill. I had a pickup from the Army and I was furnished tires and gas and about everything else. I could go home at night..... I worked at Hill Field until I finally got to where I was making \$200.00 per month. Then I got up to \$2,800 per year.

I worked for six years around hill and I got wise. I finally got to where I could make more money working for the big contractors, and the big contractors started coming in. James I. Barns came to my house and wanted to hire me as a construction superintendent and they would pay me \$3,000 per year. I worked for James I. Barns, Peter T. Whitt and all those contractors. One day a contractor got kind of mad at us and fired a bunch of guys and another man drove up with his car and asked where we were all going. They told him the man from Chicago got mad and he fired a bunch of them. He was swearing at the Mormons and one thing or another. The guy asked them how they would like to go to work for him and took all those men. He had 40 warehouses to build, so I quit the one guy and went to work for another and then all the old men that were on the old project came to work for me again. I was kind of getting pretty stuck on myself there. I could take all the men and everything else and go where I wanted. The war was on and men could work wherever they wanted too.

I was bishop of the Roy Ward for about six years and I'd been a member of the bishopric for about five years. I then decided to move to Nyssa and they released me as Bishop. I hadn't been in Oregon but a few weeks when they called me to be branch president there. I thought to myself that I hadn't been bishop quite long enough so I guess the Lord wanted to leave me there until they made a ward out of the branch and then they put me on the High Council. That was another good experience. I was on the High Council for three or four years, then I moved to Boise, and they put me to work there in the Aaronic Priesthood. We have never been where we weren't working for the Lord. When we moved back into Salt Lake, I was called upon to be a leader in the priesthood quorum.

I moved around quite a bit and I was able to keep plugging along. I was called upon by the church to go out of town to build chapels. I went out to Ely,

Nevada to build the chapel there and built one, and then down to Birmingham, Alabama. I came back to Reno and built another chapel then I got into the wards in Utah. In Brigham City I remodeled a chapel and then I finished a job I was doing for Kaiser Engineers at Thiokol Chemical Co. north of Brigham City. Then the President of the church called me to go Hawaii and down to Australia. We were called upon to go to Hawaii to work on the Polynesian Village and then we went to Australia and worked there for almost four years building a chapel.

I have had some miraculous things happen in my dealings in and around the church, in building the chapels and helping with the wards. It seems like I have been called to go where there were no experienced people and no builders or hardly anything. We have built the church and had many members help us...It always worked that we could organize the ward as soon as I got the buildings and facilities working, so then the church could grow. The kids that were just young boys worked as building missionaries and grew. Then they would become bishops and they are building the chapels and handing it down to younger ones again.

Leslie Willis **Stoker** died on 24 Oct. 1989, in West Jordan, Salt Lake, UT.

Lee Hammon Stoker

My mother, Lettie Matilda Hammon, tells the story that when I was born, her father, Levi Byram Hammon, arrived home from New York with seven stallions in a boxcar and it was left on a rail siding just an eighth of a mile from our house. Grandfather made sure the horses were tied secure so they would not fight each other. He walked to our house and found mother in bed with a newborn son. He came into the room and when mother showed me to him he said, "Let (that's what he called mother for short, instead of Lettie) that sure is an ugly baby. What are you going to name him? "Mother replied. "I'm going to name him Lee Hammon, after you." That's how I got my name.


I have heard so many things about how good a my grandfather was that it has been a great challenge to me to have his name and live so that when I meet him I can say I have honored his name. I remember Grandfather Hammon coming to our house in his one seated buggy with his team of dapple gray horses. He always had their tails done up in a bob, braiding the long hair at the bottom of the tailbone. The rings that the lines run through were white with red, white and blue rings on a strap that were fastened to the top of the harness strap that fastened the harness to the collar. The bridles had a colored rosette on each side on the upper part of it. The gray team were well kept and were fed grain daily.

He came to house one day and Mother let me go with him. I was about four years old. We went from home toward Ogden which was about 7 miles away. As we went through Riverdale, we came to the Weber River. Granddad said to me, "We will ford the river so the tires on my buggy will be soaked from the water." This is how they would keep the wood in the wheels from drying out and getting loose. Being young I did not understand. I thought we should use the bridge, but Granddad turned off to the side of the road by the bridge and we

started across the water. The river was high and the horses sank in till the water

came almost to their backs. I guess they were swimming and the buggy went down to where the water came up in the bottom. Granddad climbed upon the seat with his feet and held me on the seat with one hand and held the lines with his other one. Soon we were on the other side and back upon the road.

On we went. Soon we came to where his equipment was working. He was building a road which is the south end of Washington Blvd. as it is today. He had a steam shovel loading dirt into dump wagons and hauling the dirt to a fill on the road bed. There were also horse-drawn Fresno scrapers pulled by four horses or mules.

About the time we arrived, we heard a peculiar noise. Granddad said, "Do you hear that noise?" I said, "Yes, what is it?" He replied, "It's the mules and they are telling the drivers it is dinner time. Every day about a quarter to twelve the mules begin to bray." That was the first time I had seen a mule. That was the last time I had a ride with Granddad. He took sick the next fall and went to bed with heart trouble. He died the next spring. He was buried on my sister Eunice's birthday on March 2, 1915.

At the time our family had whooping cough and we had a little sign tacked on the front of our house that said, "Whooping Cough." That was on there for three weeks. The family could not go out in public or to school till the sign was taken down. Those who had already had the disease could go out but not those who had it or those that had not had it. They must stay home. We stood at our front window and watched as Granddad's funeral procession went by. The black hearse with two men sitting in the driver's seat on top and Granddad's white team pulling it. Granddad had requested that his team should haul him to his grave. It seemed the buggies would never end that followed in the procession.

My grandfather was a great breeder of horses and had many stallions and mares. True to his name, during my childhood, I became the owner of many horses. Mine being stick horses. When Dad and Uncle Ren [Stoker] took their land out of sagebrush, they planted a row of Lombardy Poplar trees along the west fence line of their property. My cousin, Wells [Stoker], and I played under those trees and we would break off the young saplings and make stick horse of them. We must have had about 100 horses. We had them named after our dads' horses, Granddad's horses, and all the other horses whose names we could recall. We had pulling matches, races, and buggy races with our horses just like the adults did in real life.

I remember Uncle Frank Hammon being in Australia on a mission.....I remember him coming home and telling us about his mission. One day he and his companion went to a home at noon and they were invited to have dinner with the family. They had a pie made from rabbit meat and he said they really enjoyed it. After dinner they went outside and were talking to the man and over by the side of the house was a box with an open top and some rabbit feet were poking out. There were a number of flies flying around it. The man stepped over and pulled a rabbit out by the legs and reached down and took hold of the hair and pulled it off the animal. He calmly said, "Well that one will be ready for tomorrow's dinner." Frank said he almost lost his rabbit dinner.

A great event was the entrance of the United States into World War I. Many of the boys from our town were going into the army, navy, and marines. There was a great need for men and horses. Many of the boys like Frank Norman, Newel Nielson were shipped to Europe and were put on the front lines with no training. Jeddy Hammon and Wallace Hammon shipped out with the navy soon after joining up. ...An armistice was signed November 11, 1918.

In 1918 I was old enough to be baptized and become a member of the Church. One Saturday all the kids who had turned eight years old from the summer of 1917 to the summer of 1918 were taken up to the canal by the cemetery to be baptized. There were willows growing along the canal. The boys went in the willows on one side of the hole where we were to be baptized and the girls on the other side. Here we changed clothes and put on the clothes we were to be baptized in. There were about a dozen kids in all.

The fall of 1918 another killer appeared in the form of influenza. It swept across America and people died like flies. It seemed there was no way to prevent or treat it. Sometimes two or three people died in one family and they were short of boxes to bury the dead. My mother was one who never got sick and

she traveled all around the town caring for families that were all sick with no one to care for them. Three people died in one day in the Olmstead family. I went with Mother and Dad to the mortuary in Ogden run by the Larkins Funeral home to see my cousin Alice Jewell and her daughter Jenny. They died the same day and were buried at the same time.

Uncle Jed Hammon was the sexton of the cemetery. Almost every day he would come and want help digging graves. We lived close by the cemetery. We got the call. Even though I was just a small boy, I was able to help before the hole got too deep.

There didn't seem to be any sure medicine to control the influenza. One of the things they gave us was hot lemon aid mixed with whiskey. We also had lemon jello with whiskey. I got so tired of the taste of whiskey that I never had a desire to become an alcoholic.

In 1919 Father bought our first automobile, a 1917 model Overland Touring car. It was a dark color with yellow wheels. The next year Uncle Amasa bought a new model T Ford. Dad and Mother took Ivan and me and Uncle Amasa took Aunt Edith, Durlin and Marion on a trip. We went to Yellowstone National Park. We traveled all day and arrived in Idaho Falls at night. We left at daylight from home and it was dusk when we got to Idaho Falls. We traveled through Malad and I remember one place along the way a sign reading, "Water, 50 cents a gallon." It was dry farm country and no water anywhere. When we got to the Davis farm, who was a cousin to Mother and Uncle Amasa, they were threshing and the threshing crew was there for supper. While waiting they had some boxing gloves and, of course, I had to put on the gloves with another kid I had never seen before or haven't seen since. We had a bout. I guess it was a draw as neither of us KO'd the other.

Father got sick late in the summer and we had rented Uncle Amasa Hammon's farm and had 20 acres of sugar beets to harvest by hand. Dad was too sick to help and it was a wet fall. Herman was just 18 years old and he had the responsibility to get the crop out. We hired two brothers of Aunt Emma Hammon to top beets. My brother, Les, was fourteen years old. He was very little help as he was just getting over a three month case of typhoid fever and was too weak to do very much. After school as a ten year old, I went to the beet field and helped load beets.

Dad got better by spring. That spring Uncle Lorenzo Stoker, Dad's only living brother, became sick and was taken to Ogden to the Thomas Dee Hospital and was operated on for appendicitis. His appendices had ruptured. He died a

few days later.

The summer of 1920, Mother had a nervous breakdown and was very sick for several months. I just noticed her acting strange one Saturday when I took my weekly bath. When I got ready to get dressed Mother came in with some of my older sister Thelma's clothes and said, "Put these on." Well you know how a ten year old boy would react to putting on dresses. Right, I just said I wouldn't put them on. Mother was determined that I would. Well about that time Dad came in. I guess someone in the family had gone for him. He rescued me and got my own clothes for me to put on. Mother was taken to West Weber to stay with Aunt Robena Greenwell until she was well enough to come home.

We also had Grandmother Hammon living with us during the late years of her life. She had become despondent. She could not remember who she was and every few days she would try to run away and head for Ogden where her brother had been sheriff many years before. Both she and Aunt Polly, Uncle Ren's wife, died in 1923.

He had been scout leader. Of the boys I had in that scout troop there has been two stake presidents, and two bishops. I took Durlin Hammon as my assistant to a Camp near Monte Cristo for some training. After a couple of years as scoutmaster I was released. I was ordained a priest on February 20, 1927 and was made an assistant to Bishop Amasa Hammon who was president of the Priests quorum.

On June 12, 1929 Ethel Blanch of West Weber and I were married in the Logan LDS Temple. I borrowed a Dodge car from my brother Leslie and we drove it to Logan. My mother and father and my sister Jane and her husband Marvin Venable went with us. ...My father Jesse Stoker and my mother, Lettie Hammon Stoker, went with us through the temple. We met one of my Grandmother Hammon's younger sisters in the temple. They were from Preston, Idaho.. She was Aunt Martha Lowe and her husband was John Lowe. After a very nice meal at the Bluebird Restaurant, we got into the car and headed for Rockland, Idaho for an Allen family reunion, who were relatives of my father.

We traveled to Burley, Idaho and arrived at the home of Uncle Ursel and Aunt Rhoda Taylor on a farm about 3 P.M. We enjoyed visiting with them and Uncle Frank Hammon's family in Rupert, Idaho. We returned to Roy, Utah to find a hailstorm had destroyed many of the crops.

I worked for Ira Ure on his farm. When I was ordained an elder, I was called to be the secretary for the quorum which had members in the Roy and Kanesville wards. I played baseball for the town of Roy. I was called to be

director of activities in the Roy ward. We had a movie one night a week and dances some weeks.

During the summer of 1931 I got a chance to work for the Rocky Mountain Packing Corporation helping run a pea vine in West Point and later to Huntsville. After the peas were harvested I was without a job. The depression was really bad. Jobs were hard to get. I answered an ad as a truck driver and when I got there a line of over 100 men were waiting to apply for that one job.

My brother Herman had moved to Lava Hot Springs, Idaho to farm with a friend of his. He needed help to harvest their crops so in August of 1931 I moved to Lava Hot Springs to work while my wife, and young son, Keith, stayed in Roy. My wife, Ethel, was working at a tomato cannery. After the season, she and Keith joined me in Lava Hot Springs. We returned to Utah in late 1931. In January, Jesse, our second son, was born in West Weber. Herman wrote to say he had rented two farms at Burley, Idaho and we would have to move there as soon as we could.

In February we started to move. I drove a truck of Uncle Amasa Hammon's to haul the milk cows to Burley. Herman and my brother, Ivan, started out driving horses on a wagon loaded with hay and some young stock. The temperature dropped down to 15 degrees above zero. I arrived ant Uncle Ursel Taylor's after dark, cold and hungry. After Aunt Rhoda gave me a good supper, I slept soundly. The next morning Arlen Taylor helped me truck the cows to the farm Herman had rented.

Arlen and I started back to Lava Hot Springs. The temperature dropped to around zero. When we met Herman and Ivan driving the stock, we loaded some of the animals in the truck. Ivan and Arlen drove the truck to Burley and I stayed with Herman bringing the rest of the cattle. That move was an ordeal. We nearly froze to death. On the next trip in the truck, Herman and I drove leaving Ivan and Arlen with the loose stock. The temperature that night dropped to seventeen degrees below zero. Ivan and Arlen drove into Rupert and stayed at the home Uncle Frank Hammon. Uncle Frank said they came in the house and went and laid on the floor in front of the stove until bedtime.

As we were not known in the area, the people we bought our supplies from refused to extend credit. Uncle Ursel Taylor was a big help to us as he was well known and he would get the things for us then we would pay him. The first year we were in Burley we were not active in the Springdale ward where we lived. We went to church once in a while as we lived three miles away and after working all week and walking part of the time three miles to Herman's, we never

felt like walking on Sundays.

One blessing the Lord gave to us was that we were able to have a good sound night's sleep as we were so tired we never lay awake after we hit the bed. We were able to break even in 1932 and gain the increase of our calves born in that year.

We had a pretty good year considering the times in 1933. Our crops made a little money for us and I was able to buy a plow and a potato cultivator. In 1935 We had a big acreage of sugar beets. I seen a 1933 Dodge truck for sale and after figuring what it would cost to haul our crops to market I decided to buy the truck. Dad moved from Utah to Idaho in 1933 and brought a truck with him. We used it to haul beets with but it gave out so I bought the truck and my brother Ivan worked with me and we hauled potatoes for Jack Simplot, a Potato dealer from Delco. Through many hours of hard work I was able to make payments on the truck and had a few tons of potatoes that was sold to Simplot and we had a pretty good year.

In 1936 I rented an 80 acre farm in the Unity community and the next year, 1937 bought the neighboring 80 acre farm. In 1937 our son Jimmie was born and in 1938 our daughter, Vanae. In 1940 a man from Burley came to our place and wanted to buy our milk to bottle and deliver in Burley. He also bought Herman's milk because we had Jersey cows and the milk was high in butterfat. A few months later he told us he would sell his business to us if we were interested. Herman and I talked it over and decided to buy him out. We started in the milk business delivering 75 quarts a day. When World War II was started, our work force was cut down until we only had one man to help. Herman spent most of his time in the milk house. Ethel was the bookkeeper and sent out the bills to our route customers. Many families were without fathers and husbands as they were in the army. Many were behind with their milk bills, but we delivered them milk hoping someday they would be able to pay back the bills. We couldn't take the milk away from children whose fathers were in the service of our country. Some made up and paid their bills and others never did, but we were able to weather the storm and keep the business going although we working almost the clock around.

Our Stoker's Dairy grew from a 75 quart route in 1940 to about 2,000 quarts of milk, a half dozen cases of coffee cream, and over 3,000 half pints of milk which were delivered to the schools and restaurants. After the war, Herman and I sold the retail dairy to Jess Yarrington. We continued to milk our cows.

My brother, Leslie, and his family moved from Utah to Nyssa, Oregon. In

the fall of 1946, my wife and I visited them, Uncle Amasa Hammon's family, and other friends who were living in the vicinity. We stayed a few days and found a 160 acre farm which we bought. We returned to Burley and I told Herman I was going to move to Oregon. He was very much surprised. I rented my Burley farm to my wife's brother, Donald Blanch.

When we moved to Oregon, the farm we bought was on the banks of the Snake River in what is called the Big Bend. It is the only part of Oregon that is on the east side of the Snake River. My brother Leslie, a building contractor, owned a 40 acre farm which we rented in addition to the farm we purchased. It was here in 1948 that our daughter, Lora Jo, was born. Keith, Jesse, and Jim, our sons, were old enough to help with the care of the dairy herd. Ethel, always willing, helped keep the milk house in order.

When we moved to Oregon we attended church in a small branch in Adrian, Oregon. Within a few years it was combined with another branch to form the Owyhee ward. When I was called as the second counselor to Bishop James A. Peterson, we were given the challenge to build a meeting house, which the ward's first bishopric had not been able to do. We rented a farm and planted it to sugar beets and potatoes, two cash crops that could bring us ready cash. The ward members donated the labor and machinery to run the farm. With the money and matching moneys from the church, we were able to start the building which was completed and dedicated by J. Reuben Clark in 1954. Also in 1954 my last son, Dennis Lee, was born.

Bishop James Peterson suffered a broken pelvis in a potato harvesting accident in 1956. Being first counselor I more or less was in charge of the ward business. The bishop really never regained his strength. As first counselor acting in the place of Bishop Peterson, I had to go to Salt Lake City on church business. I had to go to the MIA office so I left the main church office building and as I started down the hallway, President David O. McKay stepped out of door into the hallway directly in front of me. As we met, he reached out his hand and shook my hand, saying, "How are you Bishop?" He went down the hallway. I thought to myself it is strange that the prophet would call me "Bishop." A few days later I received a call to be ordained a Bishop in the church. I served twelve years in the bishopric of the Owyhee ward. In all those years my dear wife spent many hours waiting after church and other occasions. She never complained. I am grateful for her patience.

In 1949 my son, Keith, married Genevie Ballantyne. He continued to work in our farming operation. In 1952, he rented an 80 acre farm about twenty

miles away in the Sunset Valley community and moved there. Later he farmed for a year in Ontario, Oregon. In 1958 he bought a farm in Othello, Washington and moved there. Jesse, our second son, married Audrey Mecham in 1950. He continued to farm with us until the early 1960's when he moved on a farm in Burley, Idaho. A few years later he returned to Oregon and helped me in my farming operation. In late 1966 my youngest daughter, Lora Jo, married David Phillips. They settled in Parma, Idaho farming with his parents.

In 1969 we sold our farm in Oregon, and bought about 600 acres of farm land in Basin City, Washington about 20 miles south of my son Keith's farm in Othello. Jesse and his teenage sons and my son, Dennis, all worked together in our farming operation, which included sugar beets, potatoes, and grain, etc.

In 1977 I sold my part of the farm and moved to Othello, Washington to live a quarter of a mile from my son, Keith. My youngest son, Dennis, married Myra Burton in 1976. He moved to Pasco, Washington and then to Moses Lake, Washington where he works for a cement company.

In 1979 my wife, Ethel and I, accepted a mission call to Manchester, England. We returned in 1981 to our home near Othello where we stayed being close to our children. On good Friday, April 17, 1987, my wife died.




Amasa Hammon was born at So. Hooper, Davis Co., Utah, 24 September, 1884, the son of Levi Byram Hammon and Martha Jane Belnap. blessed Nov. 6, 1884 by his father. The name Hammon has been prominent in the public life and affairs of Weber Co. since the pioneer days. His mother was a first generation Utahan, being born in Ogden in 1855, the daughter of the first sheriff of Weber Co., Gilbert Belnap.

Amasa grew up in Weber and Davis County. In 1894 his father removed from So. Hooper onto land he owned in Roy. This once barren land is today a growing housing development. He attended the public schools at Hooper and in Roy, and completed his education with two years in the Weber Stake

Academy.

On Sep. I, 1892³, he was baptized by Antone C. Christensen and confirmed a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints, by Alexander Patterson, on the same day. While in school Amasa played basketball and lived on his father's farms, either in Hooper or Roy his entire youthful days.

On June 4, 1905, while currying his horse in the barn, in the village of West Weber, Daniel McFarland, son of State Representative Archie McFarland, jokingly remarked about he keen edge of his knife, and that

he could shave Amasa with it. Amasa, not taking kindly to that proposition pushed McFarland away, when Daniel jabbed the blade of the knife into Amasa's abdomen. It was considered a serious stabbing, with a "big pocket-knife" and the wound was about one inch below the naval, the blade being driven in near two-inches, lacerating the intestines. After examination it was found that the intestines were not injured and a full recovery expected.⁴

On Nov. 19, 1905 he was ordained an Elder in the Church, three days later he married Edith Hobson, 22 Nov., 1905⁵, of Hoytsville, Utah.

The following year (1906) he excepted a call to go on a mission for the Mormon Church and was served in the Southern States Mission. He remained in the Southern States Mission until 1908, when he returned to farm in Roy.

Following his return to Roy Amasa labored as a farm hand until 1909. That year he and his father organized the Hammon & Sons Construction Company, where remained until 1915, the year his father died. About 1900 Amasa's older brother, Derlin, had a two room house built for him and his small family, just north of his parent's home, on the Hammon farm. After Derlin and his family moved into their new home, Derlin went to work for his father's construction business, in Blackfoot, Idaho. Derlin was home only every three or four months and then for only a few days at a time and died in 1904, after contracting Typhoid. In the following years Emma remained at the

quaint home. During World War I, Leonard Hammon, Derlin's second boy, was working at the shops in Ogden and wanted Emma move to Ogden, where he could come home after work. Emma writes that in the fall, after her father-in-laws death, " the Hammon farm was sold, so I sold my house to Amasa Hammon, Derlin's brother, and moved to Ogden."

In 1916-1917 Amasa became superintendent of the Utah Construction Company's ranch holdings in Nevada and Oregon and from 1917-1920 directed

its farming interests. He was again on his farm from 1917 to 1920 and through all the years and with all the other responsibilities he has directed his farming interests. From 1920-1925, he was associated with B.L. Bybee in construction work and in November 1924 was elected to serve as one of the board of county commissioner of Weber County, a position his father had once held. He served for four years on the board, being released on January 1929.

While a member of the County Commission, Amasa was influential in getting the county on a budget basis and in promoting the pay as you go paving program. He also sponsored the building of the Twenty-fourth St. viaduct

in Ogden.

1926-From 28 he and Harry Hamblin conducted the Hammon Hamblin Construction Company and handled a number of important tracts in Utah and Wyoming. In 1929 Amasa took up public relations work for the Utah Power & Light Company and acted in this capacity until he was elected sheriff of Weber County in November, 1930. During 1929 and 1930 served, he under appointment by Governor Dern, as a member of the State Fair Board, and on 13 April 1931, the appointed governor


him a member of the Identification Board of Utah. He was a member of the National and State Sheriff's Association, organizing the first Ogden Pioneer days

Celebration in 1935, He also organized the Weber Farm Bureau Baseball League.

Amasa M. Hammon was a leading Church man and served as Bishop in the Roy Ward from November 30, 1924, to February 8, 1931, when he was

released. Numerous other positions Superas intendent of Sunday Schools, Amasa Hammon In April, the following year, he was again called for service with the church, serving as a missionary in England. His accomplishments as Bishop were many, with being a large one responsibility for the construction of the \$30,000 amusement and classroom addition to the ward chapel.

On April 30, 1925, a meeting was called to discuss the building of an amusement hall and it was decided to go ahead and do this in order that

there would to be a place where programs could be carried out and where dances and various socials could be held. The new building was started while Amasa Hammon was the Bishop.. The Bishop and his counselors carried on the building of the hall and finally got the building finished. On March 10, 1940 the Roy Ward Chapel and Amusement Hall were dedicated by President Rudger Clawson of the Quorum of the Twelve. The building served the citizens of Roy for nearly 70 years, before being abandoned.

He purchased a farm in Oregon, and moved there to live in 1945. His farm was located in Adrian, Malheur Co., Oregon, and he completed a new

home on it before he died. He continued to be active in civic and church affairs, while living in Oregon, and helped build the ward chapel in the Owyhee Ward. He was on the board which directed the building of the hospital in Nyssa, Ore. He died at his home near in Adrian, in Malheur County, Oregon, and was brought back to Roy, Weber Co., Utah, for burial.

On 22 Nov., 1905, Amasa married Edith Ann Hobson. She was born 8 Aug. 1883 in Hoytsville, Summit, UT, the daughter of John Henry Hobson and Sarah Ann Robinson.⁷ In 1905 the Hobson family moved to Roy from Hoytsville, Utah. The Hobson moved onto a farm on 3500W near the Hammon farm, where John Hobson farmed a number of acres.

The Hobsons were active in church affairs, many being very musical. Edith was the third president of the Roy first ward Relief Society. After her marriage to Amasa Hammon in 1905, she found herself without a husband for nearly the first two years. Amasa had accepted a calling to go on a mission and he returned home in 1908. The next December their first child, Mildred was born.

She moved to West Point after the death of her husband where she was a member of the West Point 2nd LDS Ward and formerly served as a Relief Society president and had worked in the MIA and primary. Edith died in 9 March 1969 and was interred in the Roy cemetery. Children:

Levi Durlin Hammon was born 7 Apr 1910 in Roy, Weber, UT. He was reared and educated in Weber County. On 12 Feb 1932 he married Thelma Roylance in the LDS Salt Lake Temple, and they moved to Nyssa, Oregon in 1938, remaining there three years

While in Nyssa, Durlin worked at the KS and D ranches and worked at the Amalgamated Sugar factory.

History of LaMar Hammon

I, Lamar Hammon Carver Dewey, was born November 23, 1913, in Roy, Utah, where I experienced a very happy childhood on dad's farm, with my eight brothers and sisters. We all had our assigned chores...working in the fields, milking the cows, and housework. Our reward was a movie on Friday night at the church, and an occasional dance. Dad was Bishop and mother was President of the Relief Society, so the focus of our lives was the church. I taught my first Sunday School class at age 15. When I was 17, we moved to the courthouse on 24th street in Ogden (Dad had been elected sheriff of Weber County). I graduated at age 18 from Weber High School, and spent the next three years sewing at Intermountain Knitting Mills. Most Saturday Nights, we attended lovely dances at White City ballroom. Camping out and picnicking were other recreational activities we enjoyed. Don Carlos Carver and I married when I was 21, in the Salt Lake City Temple. While Don was getting his degree in education from Utah State University, I continued working at the knitting mills. Over the next twelve years, we had four children. Measles took our second born-- a beautiful son Don Richard. After 23 years of raising my family and sewing professionally, I went to work at the Defense Depot in Ogden. I worked there for another 12 years, retiring in 1973. Don had passed away in October 1964, and in 1969 I married another wonderful man, John Eldon Dewey. John was a supervisor at D.D.O. He and I traveled extensively, including three weeks in Alaska and most winters in St. George, Utah. Last Year we visited friends and family on the east coast, but this year the extent of our travel will be to the golf course. Collectively, we have 28 grandchildren and according to my husband. about a million great grandchildren. What a life! What a joy!

Wilma "Billie" Hammon

Billie (Wilma really, but only her dad called her that) Hammon Kap was born December 10, 1915, to Amasa M. and Edith Hobson Hammon. Her early years were spent on the farm in Roy, Utah, close to all the Hammon and Belnap relations. The family moved to Ogden and lived in the Courthouse on 24th Street, while her father was serving as Weber County Sheriff. Billie attended schools in Weber County, graduating from Weber High School in 1934. She was active in many of the school's organizations and president of the Pep Club during her Senior year. Billie was a beautiful seamstress. Not only did she make her own clothes, but also those of friends and relatives, including wedding dresses and formals, and when she had her daughter, she made all her clothes, coats, and formals through out her school years. Later in her life she worked as a seamstress for several Utah Tailoring and the W.S. Butler Company, as an instructor. It was at Weber High that she met her future husband, Heino (Heinie) Kap. Heinie was a year younger than Billie. Heinie attended Ogden City schools throughout his elementary and junior high schools years.

Although supposed to attend Ogden High, he chose to travel from his home on 31st and Reeves to Weber (probably knew the love of his life was waiting there to meet him). His parents were Dutch immigrants who had joined the LDS Church and traveled from Holland with their family. While at Weber High, Heinie was an outstanding athlete and courted by all the Utah Universities for his football and basketball abilities. But true love came before athletics and he and Billie were married 7 November 1936. They made their home in Ogden.

While Billie worked at the tailoring mills, Heinie worked for Utah Concrete Pipe and drove truck through most of the Western States. Billie often accompanied him on his travels and many the story was born form their adventures. One night outside Albuquerque, New Mexico, their truck broke

down. Heinie flagged down a Greyhound bus to go to Albuquerque to get a repair truck (where was the cellular phone when you needed it?) and Billie remained with the truck (pretty brave, eh?). She awoke in the morning to find herself surrounded by Indians sitting on the ground watching the truck., Another time found Billie driving into town while Heinie sat on the hood pouring cold water over the radiator. in addition to working for the pipe company, he also helped A.A. Shaw with his coal business and farm located in Eden.

When World War II broke out, Heinie enlisted in the Army. He belonged to the Quartermaster Corps and for the duration of the war, his duties tool him completely around the world. They departed California on a troop ship sailed to New Zealand. After leaving New Zealand, they sailed to India. He drove trucks through India, Burma, China, Turkey, Lebanon, Palestine, Iraq, Persia and into Russia. When the war was over, he sailed through the Suez Canal, across the Mediterranean, through the Straits of Gibraltar, and across the Atlantic to New Jersey. After seeing some of the most ancient parts of the world, he always said nothing compared to Utah and had no desire to travel ever again.

While Heinie was off seeing the world, at the government's expense, Billie, who had been working at the Defense Depot in Ogden, transferred to San Francisco, California, and began working for the Lend/Lease Program. She worked on deals involving many countries, including Russia. She stayed in San Francisco for the duration of the war and returned home to Utah when Heinie came home in 1945.

On March 5, 1947, Jacquelyn Kap joined the family. Unusual for most expectant fathers, Heinie had no desire for a son, he wanted a daughter. When she was just a toddler, to quote Billie, "He put a diaper in one pocket and a bottle in the other," and off Jackie and Heinie went. Jackie's days were spent with one or the other of her parents, at the farm or coal yard with Heinie or the Tailoring Mill where Billie worked.

On March 24, 1957, Scott H. Kap was born. Although Jackie fervently prayed for a sister, she settled for a brother, who was fondly referred to as "Clinker" throughout Billie's pregnancy. He loved his little Welsh pony and his dog Sam. Like his sister before him, much of his early life was spent with his father, He loved to ride horses and shoot clay traps. He could drive a tractor better than most men. Once, when driving the tractor home from a job Heinie had done in Huntsville, a highway patrol trooper followed him into the yard. He was amazed that a little boy so young could drive so well and obey all the traffic laws-including using hand signals. Tragically on 5 November, 1965, at the age of 8, Scott died accidentally.

In June 1957 the family moved to the farm in Eden and became full time farmers. Heinie and Billie lived on the farm until November 1988 when they bought a home in South Ogden. After being a housewife for a few years, in 1963 Billie went to work for the Dee Hospital in Ogden as ward clerk. She retired from the McKay-Dee hospital in 1976. After her retirement, she devoted a large amount of her time to oil painting, a hobby she had taken up in 1965 after Scott's death. Her home is filled with the beautiful paintings she has done over the years.

For the most part, Heinie retired from farming in 1982. He spent the rest of his life playing golf as often as possible (but never on Saturday) Although he didn't start playing until he was 59 years old, when he died at the age of 74 on 1 April 1991, he had a 8 handicap.

Ruth Hammon Owen

Ruth Hammon was born on June 13, 1925 in Roy, Utah, where she was also raised, Ruth Hammon believes that her life from the age of six to ten was quite different from most children's. In 1932, her father, Amasa Hammon, was elected sheriff of Weber County. During thus time, Ruth lived and played in the jail of the Weber County Courthouse. "I Guess you might say I spent four years in prison." Ruth quips. "There really wasn't many places to play around there. If you were outside screaming and playing like most children, we- Myrla and I, were always called inside to play. Our playroom was quite unique; it had bars on the windows." Ruth was the youngest daughter of nine children. Her mother was Edith Ann Hobson. "We used to play hopscotch on the floor of the kitchen where the meals were made for the prisoners by the trustees. "Ruth remembers. "We used to have a lot of fun stealing tidbits to eat." On the weekends, Ruth says that "we used to play in the clock tower, running up and looking out over the grounds of the courthouse." She also mentions that there was a Chinese restaurant next door. "The owner had some young children and, of course, we spent a lot of time playing with them in and out of the cafe. We used to go to the First Security Bank building and ride up and down the elevator, over and over again.

Ruth took tap dancing lessons and danced at the old Orpheum theater. She tells of how she and her family would, "sit on the front lawn at night, on weekends, watching the young couples-the girls in formals-walking in the gardens of the White City Ballroom." Says Ruth, "I hope this information brings memories back to all the girls."

Ruth was baptized at the Ogden 6th Ward. She attended schools in Roy, Riverdale, and graduated from Weber High in 1943. When she and her family moved back to Roy, she did most of the things kids do; rode the derrick horse, hoed beets, and chased the cows. However, Ruth says, "I refused to milk them."

At one point, Ruth went to work for Robin's Canning Factory.

Ruth met her future husband in high school in 1942. Charles Delbert Owen (who goes by his middle name), graduated and entered the Air Force shortly after they met. They corresponded from November 1942 until August 1943, when he came home on leave. They were married on September 3, 1943. Following their wedding vows, Delbert returned to Puerto Rico, where he was stationed as a member of the Air Transport Command.

Ruth recalls that "while Del was in the service I worked at several different places. The place I like the best was as a clerk/typist and telephone operator at Western Union. I worked there for two years. Then I worked at the Utah General Depot until Delbert came home." Delbert was discharged from the Air Force in November 1945 and went to work for the Southern Pacific Railroad for the next 3 1/2 years.

On May 24, 1946 Ruth gave birth to the first of five children; Dee Charles Owen, soon followed by Brent Hammon Owen, born August 4, 1947, and Deborah, born April 12, 1949. Two years later Ruth was transferred to the Base Hospital, but ended up in the Missile Control Section.

In 1976 Ruth and Delbert moved to West Point, Utah, where they resided for 18 years. "All our children have married and moved away, " Ruth states, "Brent in California. Was the tenth child of Levi Byram
Hammon and Martha Jane Belnap,
who were each very sturdy Utah
pioneers. She was blessed 2 Dec 1886.3

My first school days began in Hooper, Utah. About one year after I started school my father moved his family to Roy, Utah, where we lived until I was married. While living there I completed my schooling.

I worked in our church from the time I was 14 years of age. At that time the Roy Ward was organized and I was called to act as secretary in the mutual (Y.L.M.I.A.). I held this position for five years. I was then called to be the first

counselor to May Jones, in the Mutual Improvement Association. I held this office for one year. I also worked in the Sunday School as a teacher in the second intermediate department. I labored in these position for several years or until I was married.

I married in the Salt Lake City Temple to Alex Ursel Taylor, November 13, 1907, by Brother John R. Winter.⁴ We were blessed with eight children, seven of whom lived to maturity. A baby boy, born between Norene and LaVar, died without a name.

We lived in Roy, Weber County, Utah, and in Harrisville, Weber County until 1918, when we moved to Idaho. I didn't do much work in the church until now (1945) except to be a member of the Relief Society. Also I worked in the Religion Class. At the time we moved to Rupert, Idaho, I had the baby boy that died. I had four living children at the time.

We lived in Rupert, when we first came to Idaho, living there for about one year, working for the sugar company. We then moved to Paul, Idaho, where we bought a small farm of our own. Here we lived for nine years. While living there I worked a great deal in the church. I worked for the M.I.A. for about five

or six years. I held about every office in the organization except secretary. I acted as President for about three or so years and I was theology class leader in the Relief Society for five years. I think I really got my religious schooling in

this society. I also worked some in the Sunday School and in the Primary.

We moved from Paul, where we lost our farm, to Springdale, Idaho in February 1927. By this time we had six While children. living in Springdale, our last baby was born.. We lived here two years and I helped some in the ward, being first counselor in the Relief Society to Marchant. Hattie From Springdale we moved to Beetville, where we belonged to the Burley 1st Ward. In Beetville we lived nine years and I worked a great deal in the ward, being President of the M.I.A. for two years then I was called to labor in the Relief Society. In the Relief Society I labored for nearly
