bodies have any
ecclesiastical
authority. Councils,
consisting of ministers,

and laymen, may
be called to admit
churches, to ordain
ministers, or to re-
cognize new churches
at the invitation
of individual churches

was sent to the office for
sluffing classes. At night
I attended a leap year
ball given by the seniors
of Heber. There was a

Jan, 3, Sat. Hauled a load
of hay from the hay
shed to the barn. Went
to the lumber yard in
the afternoon. At night
I stayed home.

Jan, 4, Sunday. I did
not go to Sunday school
but stayed home and
read Excerpt History.
In the evening I went
to Sacrament Meeting.
Oder C. M. Walker

addressed the audience.
After meeting I strolled
around with Mabel
Farris.

Jan 15, 1912. I went to school
and was sent to the
office for shipping classes.
At night I went to
Pies Hood meeting and
from there to the N. G.
where the Strollers
Quartet gave a grand
entertainment of music
and readings. I was
again with Mabel.
Jan 16, I went to school
and was again sent
to the office. At night

I went to meeting
after which I was again
with Mabel.

Jan 17. I again attended
school. In the after-
noon the basket ball
team of which I am a
member went up to
the Deaf School where
we defeated them
62 to 29. At night
I went to Mutual
and gave a lesson
on Companionship.
After meeting I walk-
ed around to the Amus-
Amusement Hall where
the girls were having
a party. While standing

back against the building with two other boys. Kelta Belnap Marriott and Doug Belnap came out and threw a ^{dish} full of water on me. I was highly enraged and told them what I thought of their noble deed.

A little after the janitor (a hot headed Dutchman) came out and was going to send us home. He would not go and he struck one of the

boys. I grabbed hold
of him and pulled
him off. Afterward had
done this I was sorry
that I did not
knock some of his
teeth out instead.

Jan 18. I attended school
during the day. Sluffed
the third period and
went over to a store in
company with Mabel.
He bought candy and
returned to school. He
went up in the balcony
of the Assembly Hall
and ate the candy.
In the afternoon I
sluffed basket ball

practice and went
home with Mabel buy-
ing more candy on
the way home. At
night, Lowell McKee
and I went to the
Garden Theatre to see a
play called the "Third
Degree."

Jan 19 - Friday, I got up
rather late. Mother
had a baby girl about
10 o'clock. I stayed home
in the morning and
held the baby while
my cousin Edaline,
Belnap did up the
work. Mother was

in a faint and the
baby could not be
with her. In the
afternoon I went to
school and after

an address. In the
course of my life I

I believe that I will

I got excused from
school to go home

and get some rest ^{for the game} as
I was very tired for I
had not much sleep
for two nights past.
During the day I
got much worse. My
head ached and I be-
gan to chill even
when around a fire.
Later in the afternoon
I went down town
and got a shave after
which I went up
to school for a
short time. At night
I took Felix Harris
over to the game arriv-
ing there after all
the others were dressed
and waiting.

The game ended 44 to 16 U. of A. Freshmen.

I went into the game feeling very weak and sick, but I think that I played as good as I ever did with the exception of the last few minutes of play when my strength gave out on me. After the game I felt much better and went down town to a picture show and then over to an ^{ice} cream parlor ^{with Mabel} I got home about 10 o'clock but I could not sleep. I lay tossing

upon the bed for
a couple of hours
when I got up
and walked the
floor, I lay down
on the couch and
went off to sleep
feeling much bet-
ter when I awoke.

Jan. 25. I felt very weak
and sore when I awoke
but nevertheless I got
up and went to school.
The day passed quietly
but at night I went
to a reading at the
Academy. Lura Poulsen
of the U. of C. read
Madame Butterfly.
I was in company with

Mabel Harris. After the
lecture (it being rather
warm) we strolled
around.

Jan 26. - 12 I went to school
and was sent to the
office for not attend-
ing school on the 24th.
This was a mistake
as I was excused
on the 24th before
leaving school. At
night Mabel Harris
and I attended a
dance at school
given by the juniors.
Jan 27th Sat. There is
no school on Saturday

I had been out so much during the last week and yesterday was half sick I remained home this day.

Jan 28 - Sunday. I went to Sunday school in the morning. At noon I went home for dinner. After dinner I studied for an hour and then went to Union Meeting at the Weber Academy. I returned home and studied until time for meeting. At night I went

to meeting and listened
to an address by a
Prof. ^{Joseph} Powell of England.
He took up the proof
of the Book of Mormon
from the bible and
proved that the Book
was true. After
meeting Mahua West,
Powell, Mc Fay, and
Mabel Harris and
myself went to
the West home on 22nd
He stayed here for
a short time before
going home.
Jan 29. I attended school.
in At night I went

After meeting I went
around in the hall
and watched the boys
play basket ball.

Jan 30, I again went
to school and as usual
practiced ball. In
the evening I went
to board meeting.
I got excused for
a short time and
went around canvass

as stated Jan 23, 1912.

I returned to meeting
and after making

Jan 31, 1912 Wednesday
I went to school. At
assembly in the
morning much enthu-
siasm was aroused
over the game a Brigham
Feb. 2, 1912. Also for

in the afternoon. A

I went to Mutual.
I went home and studied
then retiring early.

the lecture had some

The game was to be played at the U. of U. Gymnasium but the P. U. C. broke agreements and practiced on the floor. They objected to playing on other floors because we had played one game on one and that half of our men had played on another. They said these floors were not neutral but after practicing on the U. floor three times they claimed that that floor was still neutral. He refused to play and took the matter up with the President of the High School League.

and it was decided
that we play at the
Granite Hall. The game
was ~~or~~ first called for
4 o'clock, but it was
9:30 before we got to play.
After chasing the B. Y. C.
all around and giving
them their own referee
we lost to them 51 to
28. We outplayed them
in team work but they
have us badly beaten
on basket throwing.
