

The City Council met in the City Hall  
September 15<sup>th</sup>, P.M. Mayor L. J. Terrell in the chair.

Holl called. Delegates present. Opening prayer by Councilor Parry.

Minutes of meeting held Sep. 1<sup>st</sup>, 1870, were read, and on motion by Councilor Bamfield accepted.

Minutes of meeting held Sep. 5<sup>th</sup>, 1870, were read, and on motion by Alacuman Moore accepted.

### Petitions

A petition signed by Meeker Pickter & Foy, Buckmiller & Wells, and Wells, was read, representing that as Brewers and Maltsters, they paid into the City Treasury, annually, a heavy license; that they purchased their grain from the farmers, and spent the proceeds of their business among the citizens, and in building up the City; whereas in importing Beer means were diverted from the City, which ought to be spent at home. They asked the Council to protect them in their business by imposing on all dealers in imported Beer as large a license as they pay; and made a proposition to pay their license yearly in advance, and desired, as a means of protection to them, that all dealers in imported Beer be required to do the same.

On motion by Councilor Foy the matter was laid over until the next meeting, and the Petitioners instructed to obtain from the petitioners a further statement of their grievances.

A petition was read, signed by Jos. Mc. Classis, George J. Murphy, and one hundred and forty eight others, representing that the Ogall Iron Manufacturing Company needed, for the purpose of finishing the Blast-Furnace and obtaining the necessary means to start and keep said works running for one month, about \$14,000. Ten thousand Dol. were offered by parties in Ogall City, conditioned that the other four thousand dol. is raised, of which amount some two Thousand dol. is taken by the citizens; that the said iron works would be of great benefit to the City, and increase the value of property at least twenty percent. They asked the Council to "Loan or advance to the said Co., on the security of the interest bearing, first mortgage bonds of said Co., a sum not exceeding four thousand dollars, or any part thereof, as may be necessary for said enterprise."

Another petition in favor of the Ogall Iron Manufacturing Co. was read; signed by A. W. Bennett, Pres., and Simon Bamberger, Adm<sup>r</sup>. Sect<sup>r</sup>, and sealed with the Corporate seal of said Comp<sup>r</sup>, stating that "the Ogall Iron Manufacturing Co. hereby respectfully request Ogall City subscribe for and purchase eight or nine of the First Mortgage Bonds of the Company, which they offer at par."

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Ogden, City Hall, August 11<sup>th</sup>, 1877.

The City Council met as per adjournment, Mayor Soren Farn in the chair.

Roll called. Quorum present. Opening prayer by Councilor Parry. Minutes of last meeting were read, and on motion by Councilor Parry accepted.

The Recorder stated that Israel Banfield had given bonds and duly qualified to act as Alderman of the Second Municipal Ward.

Mr. Banfield was admitted as a member of the Council.

### Petitions.

J. E. Dosley & Co. petitioned for a license as Bankers and Insurance Agents, for six months from May 1<sup>st</sup>, 1877.

Orson Eggleston, through Alderman Brown, stated that he had met with a severe accident by which he would be for some time unable to follow his daily labor. In consideration of this, he asked the Council to remit his City Taxes for 1877.

On motion by Councilor Parry the Tax was remitted, \$3.<sup>50</sup>

On motion by Councilor White the City Taxes of the following named persons were remitted on that portion of their property which was destroyed by fire on the Fourth of July, 1877: I. Ogden, City Hall, January 9<sup>th</sup> 1878

The City Council met as per adjournment, Mayor John Fair in the chair.

Roll called Quorum present. Opening prayer by Councilor Fary. — Minutes of former meeting were read, and on motion by Alderman Brown accepted.

### Petitions.

D. F. Thomas & 53 residents of Syme, representing that the County road running through the centre of their Ward, in a north westernly direction, threw the land in an awkward shape for City lots and building purposes. They asked the Council to change the location of said road, about fifty rods in length from Bengham Fort lane end, to a right angle running east to the State road, about twenty five rods. They were willing to bear the expense of making the change in the road, which would be a great public benefit. The new road would be on higher ground, and could be kept in repair at less expense than the old one.

On motion by Alderman Brown the matter was referred to the Committee on Streets.

Mrs. A. Odell. Mr. Ann Odell asked the Council to reduce her City Tax for the year 1877, as her income from rents was considerably reduced.

On motion by Alderman Canfield the Tax was reduced \$5. ~~to~~.

James Gale. James Gale, on account of losses by fire, his stock not being insured, asked the Council to renew his license up to January 1<sup>st</sup>, 1878.

On motion by Alderman Reeve the petition was granted.

J. H. Anthony petitioned for a license to keep a Hotel, situated on corner of Fifth and Young Streets, for three months from January 7<sup>th</sup>, 1878.

On motion by Alderman Canfield the license was granted at \$5 per quarter.

Wm. Puckett & Son. Messrs. Puckett & Son petitioned for a renewal of their license to Brew Beer, at their premises in Jones' Grove, for one year from January 1<sup>st</sup>, 1878.

On motion by Alderman Reeve the license was renewed at the former rates.
