



Roy Promised Early Approval Of Funds for Water System

ROY — Approval can be expected early this year on federal aid for a secondary water system for the city, Councilman Joseph Dawson has told the Council.

He said he and Mayor Charles F. Hull plus other city officials had met with Sen. Frank E. Moss recently and the senator had indicated the approval should come soon.

Councilman Dawson said the system will take about two years to put in and get in operation after it is approved.

Unless such a system can be put in operation to furnish non-treated water for water lawns and other irrigation purposes in the summer, major enlargement of the city's present culinary water system will be required, he said. Some improvements and enlargements must be made anyway.

WATER UNUSED
Councilman Dawson reported that the city had 690 acre feet unused during 1967 of the 3,000 acre feet it had under contract last year. That unused water cost the city about \$28,000, he said.

The only thing worse, however, than paying for unused water is not having enough water when needed, he said. He said the city must keep its Weber Basin water holdings to provide for needs as the city grows.

The wet spring and early summer in 1967 helped cut down on the usage, which is increasing every year. The city after it had first completed its Weber Basin purchase several years ago was using only about 1900 feet each year.

The councilman admitted that the installation of a secondary water system would stretch out the time during which the city would probably not require all

the water it has purchased "unless we get a real surge of building."

CONSIDER REZONING
The Council took under consideration a request for rezoning by a builder who wants to build a number of four-plexes in the area of 6000 South near the Union Pacific main line.

Councilmen pointed out that need to get title to required land for an 80-foot street right-of-way through the tract under consideration from 6000 South to 5600 South should be part of

the problem. The four blocks would complete clearances for a badly-needed north-south road east of the UP tracks which is vital to the city, said Councilman Clark L. Puffer.

Highway 91 is presently the only major north-south street through the city from one side to the other, he said.

Councilman suggested that tentative engineering sketches of the exact route of the street be prepared for Council consideration.

County Approves Form For Logging Trip Costs

A travel and convention expense form, designed by County Auditor Dee Wilcox, was accepted Tuesday by the Weber County Commission.

This year county officials and employees, when on authorized travel, must file with the auditor a verified accounting of their expense.

In the past, county departments have been appropriated lump sums for year's travel expense.

The county pays 8 cents for the first 500 miles by private conveyance, 7 cents for the next 500 and 6 cents for the following 500.

ISSUE DIRECTIVE
Commissioners directed out-of-state travel be paid at the rate of "second class tourist" fare on airlines in lieu of personal car mileage. Use of county vehicles must be programmed and authorized by the commission or other responsible authority.

The form lists department, date, name of employee, purpose of trip, mileage, lodging, meals

and sundry costs. Receipts and stubs for expense incurred will be turned in with each report.

In other matters, the commission approved 538 property tax exemptions for disabled war veterans.

Bank Notes New Highs In Earnings, Deposits

New highs in deposits and earnings were reached by Commercial Security Bank in 1967, according to Richard K. Hemingway, who was re-elected president and chairman of the board at the annual stockholders' meeting.

Other officers of the bank also were re-elected for 1968, Mr. Hemingway said.

Net operating earnings, after taxes, during the year were \$795,896, compared to \$650,042 during the previous year—an increase of nearly 17 per cent.

EARNINGS UP
Earnings per share were \$7.60 this year compared to \$6.50 in 1966, he said.

Business prospects for 1968 in Weber County trade area appear favorable, the bank president stated.

Loans totaled \$39,713,078 at year end. During 1967, the bank made 2,415 commercial loans of \$29,971,422; 401 real estate loans of \$7,362,006, and 5,340 consumer loans of \$8,540,110.

Average daily deposits last year were \$63,529,677, which represents an increase of \$4,743,565 over average deposits the previous year.

ASSETS GREATER
Total assets at year end were \$80,639,964, as compared to \$73,240,997 on Dec. 31, 1966. Total capital accounts at the same time were \$6,039,567, a \$394,224 gain over 1966.

Other directors re-elected for 1968 included R. H. Bischoff, Andrew Brunetti, Ralph C. Duvall, R. Scott Dye, William H. Gibson, George H. Horsley and J. E. Manning.

Dean F. Morrin, Alan Nye, Joseph O. Read, Rulon F. Starley, Charles E. Ward, W. Rulon White and Grant Bickmore also were re-elected to the board.

OFFICERS RENAMED
At the directors meeting, following the stockholders' session, Mr. Hemingway was re-elected president, with R. H. Bischoff as executive vice president and Rulon F. Starley, senior vice president.

Frank Francis Jr. was re-elected senior vice president and secretary of the board.

Vice presidents included Roy C. Nelson, Boyd H. Jeppson, Gordon Beinap and John R. Starley.

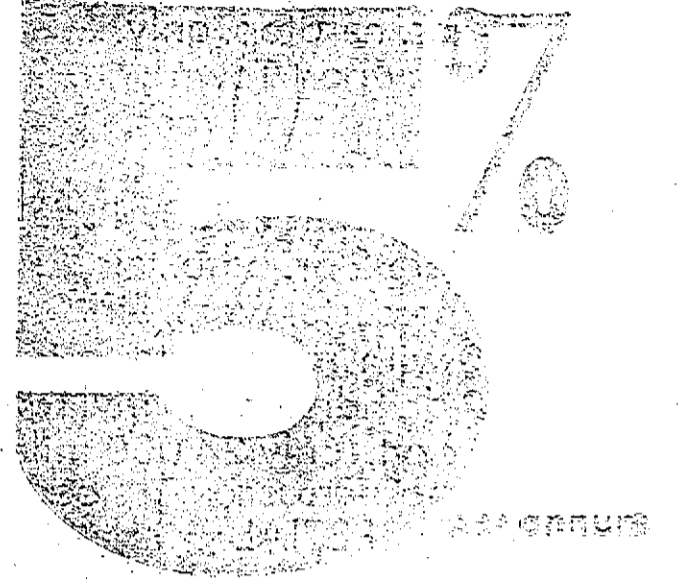

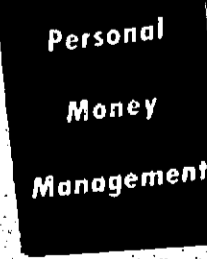
