

Train Hours For Stopover Lengthened

Expect 31,000 To Take Tours On Oct. 19, 20

The hours the American Freedom Train will be in Ogden have been slightly extended, to allow more people to visit it, the district II Bicentennial Committee was told Tuesday night.

Capt. A. S. Maurstad said the train hopes to be able to open at noon on Oct. 19, adding six hours to its visit in Ogden.

"This will allow some 31,000 residents to take the train," he said.

Capt. Maurstad told the committee that the morning hours through the exhibits has been slowed down slightly so that it now handles 1,200 people per hour.

AT DDO

The American Freedom Train display will be at the Defense Depot Ogden on Oct. 19 from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. and on Oct. 20 from 8 a.m. until 11 p.m.

Capt. Maurstad said that visitors will be able to enter the DDO at the street gate and will exit on Harrisville Road. He said there will be ample parking.

He said that plans for a bus to run from 15th and Washington to the site every half hour are being worked out.

Those visiting the train should expect to stand in line, said Capt. Maurstad.

ENTERTAINMENT

Entertainment will be provided for those waiting for the train.

Danilo Martino said that many singing and musical groups will be invited to perform at the train site.

Some of these will include the Southern Pacific 360 of Song, the Ogden Community Band and more.

Mr. Martino said that each group participating will have to provide their own transportation to the DDO and will have to pay a \$1 admission fee, since the train is non-profit.

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New Term Asked by Incumbent

Election of the mayor and council members on staggered four-year terms was advocated today by Councilman Robert H. DeBoer.

Councilman DeBoer made the proposal in a statement supporting his candidacy for a third five-year term on the six-member City Council.

He is one of the two alternate members of the council.

Councilman DeBoer said the future success of Ogden City depends on "how well the City Council meets a number of challenges we face."

The foremost problem, he said, is a development of downtown Ogden.

"I feel the businessmen and civic groups are moving to take this development happen," Councilman DeBoer said.

He said the businessmen and civic groups "must convince and make it a pleasant experience for the citizens to remain in Ogden to spend their money."

"This is the only way an investment of this size can be made," he said.

Councilman DeBoer said further development of downtown Ogden will require recreational facilities and more recreational areas. He said that "recreational areas are so important to the quality of life in Ogden."

Marriott Mall Developers Request More Time

Developers of a planned \$50-million West shopping center in Marriott have submitted a request to the County Planning Commission for an extension of time on CIP study and preliminary development plans.

The request is in several matters to be discussed at the planning commission meeting Tuesday at 4 p.m. in the County Commission chambers, seventh floor of the Municipal Building.

County Commission approved the planned commercial zoning for the site on April 4, 1974.

giving the developers, Christensen Brothers, 18 months to carry out preliminary development plans.

Planners stipulated that the six-month extension be considered, if needed.

The zoning and preliminary plan expires in October.

The preliminary plan proposed three department stores totaling 450,000 square feet with specialty and accessory square footage totaling 350,000 square feet—800,000 square feet in all—plus parking space for 4,000 cars on acres of land.

The site is on the north side of 11th between 11th and Interstate 15.

Under terms of the planning shopping center zone ordinance, a final development plan including landscaping, detailed traffic plans, building designs, proposed mass, parking and engineering plans must be approved by the county before any building permits are issued.

A full report on the progress of the shopping district development is expected at the planning meeting Tuesday.
