# College Will Begin Using New Library Media Center on Monday

The basement of the new library addition at Weber State College will start being occupied Monday, the Institution Council has been told.

The basement houses the "media center" of the college. Facilities include television, graphic and audio equipment. Final inspection of the basement was made Friday by Utah State Building Board inspectors, said Robert Fulmer, in charge of campus planning and development.

The council was told the new \$1.9 million library addition is 91 per cent complete. It is expected that the entire facility will be completed and ready for use by next August.

Major construction work has started on remodeling of the present library, said Mr. Fulmer. This remodeling is scheduled to be completed by Dec. 1.

The building is 40 per cent complete and is expected to be ready for final inspection next month.

The \$3.5 million Doe Events Center construction was reported on schedule with five of the 20 upper seating sections completed.

The chilled water plant project is five per cent complete with sheet piling being driven to retain the adjacent building. Excavation for the chiller room is about one-third complete. Footing for the cooling tower is to be completed by the council was told.

Completion of the project is expected next June.

The development of the west campus is on schedule and is anticipated in the summer of 1977.

The council was also told that sewage facilities are now in compliance with all equipment installed.

The office at the north end of the center are now occupied with some painting. These activities are being done.

The project should be completed in connection with the Fire Arts Center project.

## Ex-Banker Found Guilty on Count

A former Ogden bank vice president was found guilty last Friday night on one count of misappropriation of funds but U. S. District Court jury acquitted him on a second charge.

Gordon L. Belnap of 1928 Oakcrest Drive was found guilty of misappropriating a Commercial Security Bank cashier's check for \$5,000.

Following the guilty portion of the verdict, Mr. Belnap said, "It's certainly not true." He said he would have to consult with his attorneys before deciding on an appeal.

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## Famed Defense Lawyer Will Speak at College

F. Lee Bailey chief defense attorney for the Patricia Hearst case who has handled some of the most notorious criminal cases in recent years, lectures at Weber State College Dec. 1.

His talk will be given in the USC Fine Arts Center auditorium. General admission is \$2 for adults, and \$1 for children under 16.

Attorney Bailey has been an occasional speaker at Weber State College and is a past president of the law school.

He has been the defense attorney in such sensational cases as Dr. Carl Coppolino, Dr. Sam Sheppard, the Boston Strangler, Captain James Medina and now Patricia Hearst.

Mr. Bailey is a rather elaborate and rather ridiculous speaker.

When the storm is right, he is by accident and when it isn't, he is by design.

Mr. Bailey says somebody has to be there to protect people from it... to keep innocent people out of jail and help the dangerously imbalanced find the proper medical care.

Attorney Bailey is author of "The Defense Never Wins" and "For the Defense," and a frequent speaker at Weber State College.
