

THE SOLDIER DEAD.

Providing Headstones for Unmarked

At the last session of Congress (Act of August 11, 1886,) provision was made for continuing the work of furnishing headstones for unmarked graves for soldiers, sailors and marines, in city, town and village cemeteries and other burial places, and the war department has accordingly made arrangements for supplying all that may be required to the 80th of June, 1887. Requests for the necessary blank forms on which to make applications for these stones should be addressed to the Quarter Master General, U. S. Army, Washington, D. C. Applications can be made at any time before the 30th of June next, but it is desired that they be filed at the earliest day practicable, to enable the department to supply the stones with the first shipments which will be made early in the ensuing spring.

Mr. Gibson was of the opinion that it was before reaching Rome, for the seals are made by a peculiar instrument and were undoubtedly impressed by the agents. It is stated that in case the theft was made at or near Rome a report has been made to headquarters, according to orders in all such matters. Samuel Felt, Jr., had a number of drugs in the box car. A small amount of soap had been taken, and other common articles, the value not being very great There was on his invoice a quantity of morphine. which was found all safe, though the boxes containing it had been opened. This article was about the most valuable of any in the car, and its being left behind by the burglars shows they probably did not know what morphine was.
